THAT COUNCIL:

1) Acknowledge the incredible work of the Karuah community in supporting the delivery of the Karuah Place Plan.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of this report is to outline Council's ongoing commitment to Karuah and acknowledge and express gratitude for the collective efforts of the local community in delivering actions under the Karuah Place Plan.

The Karuah Place Plan was the first of its kind in Port Stephens and it's a standout example of what's possible when Council and community come together to deliver real outcomes.

I am proud of the progress Council has made to deliver actions since 2023, including:

- Town centre and bypass signage.
- Karuah by Night event at Longworth Park.
- Playground and pathway upgrades at Aliceton Reserve.
- RV parking area on Tarean Road.
- Raised pedestrian crossing on Tarean Road.
- Hosting the Town Teams Placemaking conference.

I am excited to see this list grow as we plan a number of projects in 2025/2026. These include:

- Accessible amenities at Aliceton Reserve.
- Road rehabilitation, Tarean Road.
- Mustons Road pathway and road repair.
- Continued Council Sponsorship of Timber and Oyster Festival.

Beyond Council projects, our Place Plans are also focused on collaboration with the community to support locally led initiatives.

I want to acknowledge the Karuah community, who have embraced this approach and delivered a number of actions that support town centre growth and vibrancy. Your willingness to offer help, donate time, expertise and resources is something to be proud of and is an inspiration to other communities in Port Stephens and beyond.

Karuah may be small, but it shows you can achieve big things when you work together. I would like to mention a few recent highlights:

- Main street beautification project planter boxes, seating, artwork and planting.
- Formation of a local Town Team.
- Karuah Bridge mural project led by Karuah Progress Association.
- Riverbank revegetation led by Landcare Karuah Conservation Crew.
- Karuah Konnect project delivering an on-demand bus service supported by Transport for NSW and run by the Karuah RSL.
- Garuwa Community Market organised by Karuah Public School P&C.
- Tourism resources developed through the Tiny Tourism Town initiative by local businesses and Destination Port Stephens.
- Timber and Oyster Festival led by the Festival Organising Committee.
- Karuah Christmas Carols partnership between the Karuah RSL and Karuah Progress Association.

Projects such as the main street beautification, led by Lisa Floyd and the Karuah Progress Association, supported by local volunteers and businesses, perfectly demonstrate positive community-led action. Volunteers and local business donated their time and resources, culminating in a working bee to install the seating, planter boxes, art and street planting on Tarean Road.

I would also like to acknowledge all the volunteer committees who work tirelessly throughout the year to deliver sporting opportunities in the community. These opportunities include tennis, cricket, yacht club, golf, netball and rugby league.

It's inspiring to see a positive group committed to creating change in their town. The Karuah community shows us that with the right people and community spirit, you don't need big budgets to get great things done.

On behalf of Port Stephens Council, I would like to extend our thanks to the Karuah community for their passion and commitment to creating lasting change in their town.
