About this report

Under section 393AA of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021*, after each ordinary election of councillors, the Electoral Commissioner must provide the Minister with a written report on the conduct of the election. This report is provided with respect to the 2024 NSW Local Government ordinary elections and is presented in two parts.

Part one provides an overview of the elections conducted by the NSW Electoral Commissioner on Saturday, 14 September 2024. It includes aggregated statistical information about the elections, information about voting methods, venues, staffing and funding. It also describes the impact of recent changes to the legislation that governs the conduct of local government elections in New South Wales.

Part one also summarises the integrity and enforcement activities of the Electoral Commission in relation to the conduct of participants in the elections. This work includes the registration of candidates, groups, and third-party campaigners for campaign finance regulation purposes; compliance operations undertaken during the elections; investigating allegations of breaches of electoral law; and any legal proceedings commenced to date in relation to the elections.

Part one also includes recommendations by the Electoral Commissioner for legislative reform around the conduct of local government elections.

Part two provides information about each individual local council election, including candidates, results (of councillor, mayoral, referendum and poll contests as applicable to each council), the breakdown of votes by vote type for councillor elections, as well as staffing and venue numbers by council.

This report is supplemented by the outcomes of independent research, which measured and evaluated the level of the satisfaction of election stakeholders (electors and political participants) with the NSW Electoral Commissioner's conduct of the 2024 Local Government elections.

About the NSW Electoral Commission and the NSW Electoral Commissioner

The NSW Electoral Commission is constituted as a three-member independent statutory authority under the *Electoral Act* 2017. The three-member statutory body has functions under the *Electoral Act* 2017, *Electoral Funding Act* 2018, the *Local Government Act* 1993 and the *Lobbying of Government Officials Act* 2011 and is responsible for enforcing electoral, funding and disclosure, and lobbying laws.

Under the Electoral Funding Act, the three-member Electoral Commission has the function of administering the election funding, expenditure and disclosure scheme, including registering electoral participants for the purposes of that scheme. It also investigates and enforces breaches of electoral legislation in relation to both electoral funding and the conduct of elections, including elections held under the Local Government Act. Under the Lobbying of Government Officials Act, the Electoral Commission has the function of maintaining the Register of Third-Party Lobbyists and Lobbyists Watch List, and the enforcement of obligations relating to lobbying.

The Electoral Commissioner for New South Wales is a member of the NSW Electoral Commission and conducts state elections and by-elections for the NSW Parliament; local government elections and council by-elections and countbacks (if engaged to do so), NSW Aboriginal Land Council elections and elections for registered clubs, statutory boards and State-registered industrial organisations (if engaged to do so).

Under the Electoral Act, the Local Government Act and other New South Wales laws, the Electoral Commissioner has the function of registering political parties, conducting elections and, in conjunction with the Australian Electoral Commission, maintaining the Electoral Information Register of enrolled electors for New South Wales.

The Electoral Commissioner is also the head of the Public Service staff agency (also known as the NSW Electoral Commission). The staff agency supports the Electoral Commission and Electoral Commissioner in exercising their distinct but complementary statutory functions for delivering elections and regulating participation in the political process. The staff agency is a "separate agency" under Part 3 of Schedule 1 of the *Government Sector Employment Act 2013*.

The three-member NSW Electoral Commission provides advice to the Electoral Commissioner when requested but cannot direct the staff agency or the conduct of elections or matters relating to the electoral roll. The Electoral Commissioner, in her capacity as head of the staff agency, is responsible for its day-to-day management, including financial management and is the accountable authority.

The Electoral Commission and the Electoral Commissioner, as applicable, provide processes and guidance to assist political participants (including candidates, parties, elected members, political donors, third-party campaigners, associated entities and lobbyists) and electors to comply with their obligations, and engage with the public to make it easier for people to understand and participate in the democratic process.

The NSW Electoral Commission's staff work across four divisions: Elections; Information Services; Funding, Disclosure, Compliance and General Counsel; and Corporate. References to the NSW Electoral Commission in this report may be to either the three-member statutory body or the public service staff agency, as the context requires.

Foreword from the Electoral Commissioner

As is required by section 393AA of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021*, I am pleased to present this report on the conduct of the 2024 NSW Local Government elections to the Minister for Local Government, the Hon Ron Hoenig, MP.

The 2024 NSW Local Government elections were administered by the then Acting Electoral Commissioner Dr Matthew Phillips and regulated by the NSW Electoral Commission, with the support of NSW Electoral Commission staff. The year 2024 was a year in which more people voted around the world than in any previous year and the importance of trusted election administrators was a common topic. In 2024, 5,242,086 electors (the number of enrolled electors in contested councils/wards) and 3,888 candidates in New South Wales were once again fortunate to be able to participate in a system of local democracy administered and regulated by an independent, expert and impartial electoral commission.

All but two councils chose to use the NSW Electoral Commissioner as their election manager. Elections in all 127 local government areas holding elections were subject to the same electoral funding and disclosure rules, which are administered and enforced by the NSW Electoral Commission. Some other important items to note about these elections, which are discussed in further detail later in the report, are:

- pre-poll (early voting in person) increased from the 2021 ordinary elections
- postal voting increased from the 2021 ordinary elections
- the link between public trust in the integrity of democratic processes and the capacity of the NSW Electoral Commission to deliver operational excellence was evident at the two recounts conducted for Edward River Council and Hay Shire Council, as well as a Parkes Shire Council check count review
- the NSW Electoral Commission's safety culture continued to mature, including with the support of legislative amendments that specifically recognised the safety and wellbeing of election officials.

As a recent NSW Information Commissioner, I will also note here the NSW Electoral Commission's efforts to manage an election-related data breach. At these elections, the Electoral Commission experienced a data breach that involved the loss of a printed copy of an electoral roll for a ward. Enrolment information is personal information and is recognised as one of the most important data sets held by any electoral commission. When it identified that one copy of a roll was missing, the NSW Electoral Commission worked closely with other agencies to investigate what happened and to respond appropriately. This included contacting the individuals affected by direct mail, with details of the information that was printed on the roll, and providing guidance about what protective steps they might consider and other sources of information to assist them. The Electoral Commission also apologised for the breach because, even if the loss of the roll was accidental, we recognise that voters need to able to trust electoral commissions and the protection of privacy in NSW legislation is important for all citizens even if it does not involve digital information. More discussion about the data breach is also found later in this report.

As a member of the three-person Electoral Commission, I would also like to acknowledge the significant increase in the use of online electoral funding registration services at this election. A dedicated project team has been gradually delivering expanded online capacity for electoral funding and party registration to assist election participants since 2021. The uptake of online funding and registration services for these elections, which involve many more participants than a state election, was pleasingly high at 1,644 candidates and 189 groups. We are aware of and understand the preference for election participants to have a single sign-on for all of the Electoral Commission's online services. We are not yet funded for the system and process changes necessary to make that possible but we will continue to make improvements wherever we can to the Electoral Commission's online services.

Like previous election reports, I also wish to include a brief acknowledgement of the integrity challenges that are inherent in the grand scale of whole-of-state elections and remind readers that these are among the largest public participation events in New South Wales (after state and federal general elections). The Electoral Commission has always been an advocate for the value of investing sensibly in maintaining trust in our democratic institutions, including for local government, and we will continue to do so. This report summarises how funding (both provided and anticipated) has been applied to the services we delivered for these elections and acknowledges the challenge we have to reflect on how elections can be run more efficiently without compromising public trust.

The delivery and regulation of efficient, accurate and trusted elections continues to rely heavily upon the support and capability of NSW Electoral Commission staff. I extend my gratitude to the former Acting Electoral Commissioner and staff of the NSW Electoral Commission, including our temporary election workforce and contractors, for the successful conduct of the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. I would also like to thank electors, council staff, candidates, registered political parties and other stakeholders for their high levels of engagement in this important event.

About the 2024 NSW Local Government elections

Elections conducted by the NSW Electoral Commissioner

The 2024 NSW Local Government elections were the fifth whole-of-state local government ordinary elections conducted since changes to legislation made in 2011 gave councils the option to choose their election provider. Councils can engage the NSW Electoral Commissioner or a commercial election service provider to conduct their election. Legislation does not permit councils to run their own election.

There are 128 local government areas in New South Wales, each represented by a council. Of the 128 councils in New South Wales one did not hold an ordinary election in September 2024 and two did not engage the NSW Electoral Commissioner to conduct their elections:

- · Central Darling Shire Council was under administration and therefore did not hold an election
- Fairfield City Council engaged a commercial election service provider
- Liverpool City Council engaged a commercial election service provider.

Although the NSW Electoral Commissioner did not conduct elections for Fairfield City and Liverpool City councils, the requirements for registration for electoral funding purposes (accepting political donations and incurring electoral expenditure) apply to candidates, parties and other participants in those councils' elections. Offences under local government electoral laws at all council elections are also enforced by the NSW Electoral Commission. See Services provided for all councils for more information.

Fairfield City Council and Liverpool City Council should be contacted directly for information about the administration of candidate nominations, registration of electoral material, polling places, voting and results (see fairfieldcity.nsw.gov.au and liverpool.nsw.gov.au) for the September 2024 ordinary elections.

Contested elections

See Appendix A for a list of councils/wards that engaged the NSW Electoral Commissioner to conduct their elections and the types of elections conducted.

Councillor election

A local government area is either undivided or divided. A divided council is split into wards, and each ward has its own councillor elections. Councillors in an undivided council are elected by all voters in that council area. Councillors in a divided area are elected to represent each ward within the council area. An equal number of councillors are elected for each ward. The number of councillors elected varies between councils.

Mayor election

Mayors can be either elected by the voters (direct or popularly elected mayor) or elected by the new councillors (and from the councillors) following a council election. The NSW Electoral Commission is not involved in the election of mayors by the councillors.

The election of a mayor by voters and the election of councillors are conducted at the same time but are considered separate elections, with separate ballot papers. If a council has a total of 10 councillors to be elected, and the mayor is elected by the voters, the election for that council would be for nine councillors and one mayor. A candidate can run for both councillor and mayor but, if elected as mayor, they cannot also hold office as a councillor.

Constitutional referendum

A council may decide to conduct a constitutional referendum. A constitutional referendum is required to be conducted to change the constitutional structure of the council. For example, changing the number of councillors, whether to divide the council area into wards or abolish all wards, or determine whether the mayor should be elected by the voters or by the councillors. For a constitutional referendum to pass, a majority of voters in the council area must have voted in support of the proposal. Voting in a constitutional referendum is compulsory and the result is binding on the council. If the constitutional referendum is passed, the result takes effect at the next local government elections.

Council poll

A poll is conducted to determine the opinion of electors. A council may decide to conduct a poll on any issue and the result is used by council to guide further planning decisions. The council can poll all voters in the council area or only a portion of voters. Voting in a poll is not compulsory and the result of a poll is not binding on the council.

Uncontested elections

In an uncontested election, the number of candidates nominated is the same or less than the number of councillor positions available for election. In these situations, all the accepted nominating candidates are declared elected. If the number of nominating candidates is less than the number of councillor positions, a by-election is required to fill the remaining vacancies. Electors are still required to vote if the council is conducting a mayor election, referendum or poll.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, 22 council/ward elections were uncontested:

- 18 councils/wards received the same number of nominations as vacant positions these candidates were declared elected without the need to conduct an election (see Table 1)
- four councils/wards received less than the required number of nominations to fill their vacancies. The nominating candidates were declared elected and a by-election was required to fill the remaining vacancies (see Table 2).

By-elections for Berrigan Shire Council, Cowra Shire Council, Junee Shire Council and Lachlan Shire Council (E Ward) were scheduled for Saturday, 23 November 2024.

At the close of nominations, only one candidate had nominated for the one vacant councillor position for Lachlan Shire Council (E Ward) – this candidate was declared elected without need for a by-election to be conducted. The remaining three councils conducted a by-election to fill their councillor vacancy. Results for these elections are available on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

Voting channels

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, electors could choose to vote using one of the following channels (subject to eligibility):

- pre-poll (early) in person voting (subject to eligibility criteria)
- technology assisted voting in the form of telephone assisted voting (for electors who are blind or have low vision)
- postal vote (subject to eligibility criteria)
- voting in person on election day
- declared institution voting at appointed venues.

Absentee voting

Absentee voting is not available at local government elections in New South Wales. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, electors had to vote at a polling place in the council/ward in which they were enrolled or a polling place that was established for multiple areas/wards. Not offering out-of-area (absentee) voting is a key difference between the legislation that applies to local government and state elections in New South Wales. One practical reason for not providing for absentee voting is that it would not be feasible to have a supply of ballot papers for every councillor, mayoral, poll and constitutional referendum at every polling place across the state.

To mitigate the inconvenience for electors, the NSW Electoral Commission establishes some polling places to service more than one local government area or more than one ward. This enables some absentee-style voting options for electors. However, the NSW Electoral Commission does not appoint multi-council voting centres at scale as operationally this would still be difficult to manage due to the volume of ballot papers that would be required to be available at each polling place.

A broader offering of out-of-area voting would benefit from electronic mark-off systems. A process for providing allarea voting options at scale would be a print-on-demand ballot paper solution. This option, however, would require systems and infrastructure upgrades for which the Electoral Commission is not presently funded.

Voting methods

Local government elections utilise various voting methods:

- Mayoral elections use an optional preferential system.
- For **councillor** elections, when two or more councillors are being elected, a proportional representation system is used. Councillor ballot papers may contain group voting squares. In such cases, electors can vote above the line on the ballot paper for one or more groups of candidates or below the line for at least the minimum number of individual candidates.

- A number '1' for a group above the line records a first preference vote for the first candidate in the group with preferences going to the other candidates in the group in the order in which they are listed. Preferences then go to the next group, if a second preference is included for a group above the line, and so on. The alternative is marking squares 'below the line' in order of preference for individual candidates, at least up to the minimum number of preferences required for that election.
- Referenda and polls use a "Yes" and "No" answer framework.

Service charter

The 2024 NSW Local Government elections *Service charter* provided an overview of the services delivered to stakeholders of the local government elections run by the NSW Electoral Commission. Impartial, fair and safe elections are central to the mission of the NSW Electoral Commission. The *Service charter* outlined the targets and measures set by the NSW Electoral Commission. The overarching goals were to ensure the electors of New South Wales participate freely in transparent electoral processes and that stakeholders trust the NSW Electoral Commission has conducted the elections with fairness and integrity. The *Service charter* was published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website and distributed to all council general managers.

Services provided for all councils

The NSW Electoral Commission retains responsibility for providing certain electoral roll services for all councils, including those that do not engage the Electoral Commissioner to conduct their elections:

- printed composite rolls (the residential and non-residential roll combined) are supplied to all councils
- each council is provided with a list of electors who are registered to automatically receive postal votes (registered general postal voters)
- · confirmation of 'silent elector' details is provided
- copies of the relevant electoral roll are provided to candidates on request.

The NSW Electoral Commission is also responsible for the registration of all electoral participants under the *Electoral Funding Act 2018*, including those for Fairfield City Council and Liverpool City Council which did not engage the NSW Electoral Commissioner for their 2024 elections.

Offences under local government electoral laws at all council elections can also enforced by the NSW Electoral Commission, with electoral funding offences only being able to be prosecuted by the Commission or with its consent. For elections that are not administered by the Electoral Commissioner, the NSW Electoral Commission does not undertake field compliance operations during voting periods.

Centralised operations

To deliver consistency and efficiency in the processing of postal vote applications, processing of nominations and various count processes, the Electoral Commission established four centralised operations sites (three in Sydney and one in Newcastle). These large venues demand significant specialised logistical and staffing planning and support.

- Sydney Count Centre (Sydney Showground, Homebush)
- Centralised Postal Vote Count Centre (Sydney Showground, Homebush)
- Centralised Declaration Vote Count Centre (Sydney Showground, Homebush)
- Newcastle Count Centre (Newcastle).

Legislative framework

NSW Local Government elections are conducted in accordance with the *Local Government Act 1993*, the *Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024* (which amended the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021*). The political donations and electoral expenditure of political parties, candidates, and other election participants are regulated by the *Electoral Funding Act 2018* and *Electoral Funding Regulation 2018*.

Legislative changes and their implementation

New South Wales legislation sets out how the NSW Electoral Commissioner and the NSW Electoral Commission conduct and regulate elections and the obligations of voters and political participants. The regulation relating to the conduct of local government elections (the *Local Government [General] Regulation 2021*) has been amended by the *Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024*. In response to amendments made to the legislation that applied to the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the Electoral Commission made changes to some of its election procedures.

One week only of pre-poll

An amendment made in August 2024 to s. 326(1) of the Regulation shortened the maximum pre-poll voting period from 12 days of voting to seven days of voting. For the 2024 Local Government elections, pre-poll voting was available from Saturday, 7 September to Friday, 13 September 2024 (excluding Sunday, 8 September) for eligible electors.

To accommodate the expected trend of increasing pre-poll voting demand, more and/or larger pre-poll venues were determined to be necessary in some local government areas, along with the corresponding increase in the number of election staff.

Pre-poll voting was not available to electors unless they met legislative qualifications

At the 2021 Local Government elections and subsequent by-elections, any person qualified to vote in the election was permitted to vote prior to election day at a pre-poll voting office. This was introduced (among other measures) to help reduce risk arising from potential crowding at polling places on election day in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. However, s 321(2) of the Regulation was repealed prior to election day, meaning that electors who wanted to pre-poll were required to meet the relevant qualifications to do so. The NSW Electoral Commission made appropriate changes to its forms and communications to assist voters to understand their voting options. As anticipated, the reintroduction of qualifications to vote prior to election day did not lessen demand for pre-poll voting.

Changes to postal voting

Sections 275 and 217 of the Regulation were amended to allow postal vote certificates to be sealed inside the envelope in which electors' votes are returned, rather than be printed on those envelopes. As a result, postal vote certificates, including the elector and witness details and declarations were printed on paper inserts that were placed within the postal pack along with a reply-paid envelope. This aligned with changes made to the *Electoral Act 2017* in 2023 for state elections in New South Wales to reduce the risk in producing the required number of envelopes within statutory deadlines. Appropriate refinements were made to the process of scrutinising returned postal vote envelopes in light of the changed envelope design.

City of Sydney electors

Following the removal of compulsory voting requirements for electors on the non-residential roll for the City of Sydney, electors enrolled for the City of Sydney no longer qualify for pre-poll voting or postal voting for an election for the City of Sydney solely by virtue of being so enrolled. These changes put electors for the City of Sydney on the same footing as electors for other areas with respect to qualification for pre-poll voting and postal voting.

Authorisation of electoral material

The Regulation was amended to update the authorisation requirements for electoral material in digital or electronic formats.

Authorisation for electoral material that is an automated call

Section 356GAA was inserted into the Regulation, requiring automated telephone calls containing electoral matter (also known as 'robocalls') to contain, in a clear voice, spoken in English, the name and address of an individual on whose instructions the call was made. Contravention of this section is a criminal offence.

Authorisation for SMS text message containing electoral material

Section 356G of the Regulation was amended to provide alternative ways to meet the requirement that electoral material contain the name and address of the person on whose instructions the material was distributed.

First, an SMS containing electoral material that was distributed by an electoral participant (or on their behalf) may include a hyperlink to a website on which the name and address of the person on whose instructions the material was distributed, provided the website publishing the authorisation details remains publicly available until the end of the regulated period (i.e., until 6pm on election day).

Alternatively, an SMS containing electoral material can be distributed if a second SMS text message is sent (from the same number) immediately after the primary message and the second SMS contains the relevant name and address.

Authorisation for paid social media posts containing electoral material

Section 356G of the Regulation was amended to align with legislative requirements for state elections relating to paid social media posts. For paid social media posts, the relevant name and address must be legibly shown in the social media post as authorisation. The relevant name and address may be included:

- if the social media post includes text in the text; or
- if a photograph, image, video or animation is attached to or embedded in the social media post in the photograph, image, video or animation.

If the name and address are shown in a video or animation attached to or embedded in the post, the name and address must be legibly shown for at least three seconds.

Technology assisted voting was for use only by electors who are blind or have low vision

Section 333M of the Regulation was amended to limit the use of technology assisted voting to telephone voting by electors who are blind or have low vision – if the election manager has determined that technology assisted voting is to be used at the election.

Filming and photographing election officials and scrutineers is unlawful in certain circumstances

Section 365A(1) was inserted into the Regulation, making it an offence to film or photograph election officials and scrutineers while performing their duties, if the filming or photography is reasonably likely to cause the official or scrutineer to feel intimidated or harassed.

In addition, the new s 365A(2) of the Regulation makes it an offence to publish or distribute a film or photograph made in contravention of s 365A(1).

Health and safety at voting centres

Section 356SA(3)(b) was inserted into the Regulation to enable the election manager and each polling place manager to give directions for the purpose of protecting the health and safety of persons at an election or a place where voting is occurring. This amendment removed ambiguity about the extent of an election official's power to issue a lawful direction to maintain safety and ensured that the Commission was better placed to manage risks that can arise at polling places.

Changes to initial scrutiny counting procedures

Amendments were made to the Regulation (s 348A) to modify the method for the initial counting of votes for ballot papers that use group voting squares. This enabled the ballot papers to be counted in a manner similar to the Legislative Council ballot paper count at state elections in New South Wales. All first preferences recorded in a group voting square were counted, as were the first preferences recorded for each candidate who was not in a group with a group voting square. In addition, the number of ballot papers on which a first preference was recorded for a candidate who was in a group with a group voting square (other than by placing a mark in a group voting square) were counted. The number of informal votes and the number of envelopes containing postal vote certificates or other declarations were also counted.

This method provides for a more efficient initial count in polling places on election night while enabling the provision of key results information prior to the final check count process.

Return of pre-poll ballot boxes

Section 324 now provides that a pre-poll ballot box is to be delivered or sent to the returning officer as soon as practicable after 6pm on the day before election day, or at an earlier time specified by the election manager or returning officer.

This change supports the NSW Electoral Commission's practice during the early voting period when ballot boxes are transported to a secure central location in preparation for the count that will occur after the close of voting.

Amendments to enable adjustment of election expenditure caps ahead of the 2024 Local Government elections

The postponement to September 2021 (and again to December 2021) of the local government elections that were scheduled to be held in September 2020 created uncertainty as to when the electoral expenditure caps were to be adjusted. Electoral expenditure caps are adjusted following the end of each election period. Under normal circumstances, the end of an election period is triggered by the holding of a general election on its prescribed date. However, as the 2020 local government elections were not held on the prescribed date, the electoral expenditure caps were not adjusted as there was no trigger to end the election period.

Various amendments were made to the *Electoral Funding Act 2018* to resolve any ambiguity about the timing and method for adjusting caps on electoral expenditure and enabled the caps to be adjusted for inflation prior to the 2024 Local Government elections.

Summary of proposals for legislative change

The NSW Electoral Commission welcomes the opportunity presented by this election report to make recommendations for legislative change. It is preferable, however, that electoral legislation be amended well-ahead of any election event, to ensure there is sufficient time for the Electoral Commission to design, test and implement any changes to its systems and processes. It is difficult for an electoral commission to maintain operational excellence and trust in the integrity of its systems if changes are made late and/or are not resourced realistically. Late engagement about proposed legislative changes also limits the opportunity for the NSW Electoral Commission to undertake consultation with its regulated duty-holders to inform the best way to design and implement changes fairly and avoid unintended consequences.

A number of potential improvements to electoral practice have been identified arising from the 2024 NSW Local Government elections that would require legislative amendment. The key proposals for change are set out below.

Proposal 1

Form of the candidate information sheet

The Local Government Act requires the candidate information sheet (CIS, a mandatory component of the nomination paper) to be in the form of a NSW statutory declaration. A significant number of nomination papers at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections required resubmission or were ultimately rejected due to a candidate's failure to comply with the requirements of a statutory declaration including the authorised witness requirements. This has been a recurring issue at local government elections, resulting in administrative challenges and presenting a barrier to some candidates' participation. It is recommended instead that the Act provide for the Electoral Commissioner to determine the form and manner of the CIS, along with the introduction of an offence of knowingly making a false or misleading statement (equivalent to s. 216 of the Electoral Act), which would replace the need for a statutory declaration.

Proposal 2

Clarify the time of day by which prospective candidates must be enrolled

Section 306(2) of the Act provides that a prospective candidate must be enrolled as an elector for the area, and must be qualified to hold that civic office, at the closing date of the roll for the election. The specific time, however, is not specified. This uncertainty presents challenges in implementing policies, communicating information to stakeholders and supporting decision making. It is recommended that section 306(2) of the Act be amended to specify that to be eligible to be nominated, a candidate must be enrolled and qualified to hold office as at 6pm on the closing date for the election. This will provide certainty as to when processing of rolls may commence and align with the requirements of the Electoral Act.

Proposal 3

Prohibit distribution of postal voting applications by political participants

The Electoral Commission offers a number of application options (including by post, online and phone) for electors who wish to apply for a postal vote. Notwithstanding this, there is a long-standing practice of parties, candidates and elected members distributing their own postal vote application forms to electors. While not endorsing this practice, the Electoral Commission takes steps to encourage these election participants to include information about privacy in their application forms and give electors the option of returning the forms directly to the Electoral Commission. This practice nonetheless continues to present administrative challenges and raises both election integrity and privacy issues.

At each election, the Electoral Commission fields inquiries and complaints from electors who receive postal vote application forms from election participants. The completion of these forms involves the collection of an elector's personal information by the political participant. The *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998* (NSW) (PPIP Act) does not apply to candidates, political parties and third-party campaigners, as they are not public sector agencies. As such, personal information collected by these entities is not protected under the PPIP Act. Political parties in NSW also appear to be exempt from complying with the *Commonwealth Privacy Act 1988*, which exempts "political acts and practices" that are done broadly in connection with an election or referendum.

Further, this practice creates a risk of a form sent by an election participant falsely appearing to be made by the Electoral Commission. An example of such a risk arises where the Electoral Commission's postal vote application form is embedded in the election participant's own documentation and the participant does not clearly indicate to an elector that the material is not an official communication from, and has not been authorised by, the Electoral Commission or Electoral Commissioner.

The practice can also result in electors being disenfranchised. Some completed postal vote application forms collected by political participants are not returned to the Electoral Commission by the legislated cut-off date for receipt of those applications. In such circumstances the applicant electors are often unaware that the political participant has not returned their application to the Electoral Commission in time and, further, may be disenfranchised if they are unable to attend a pre-poll or polling place to vote in person.

In 2022, ahead of the Victorian state general election, the Victorian Parliament passed an amendment to their electoral legislation prohibiting persons other than the Victorian Electoral Commission from distributing applications to vote by post. In South Australia, it is an offence for a person to distribute, or cause or permit to be distributed, a form for the application for the issue of declaration voting papers (which includes voting by post), unless the application is in the prescribed form, states on the form that it must be returned directly to the Electoral Commissioner and no additional information or matter appears on the form or on the reverse side of the form.

The NSW Joint Standing Committee on Electors Matters recommended in its report, "Administration of the 2023 NSW state election" that the NSW Government prohibits political participants from distributing and collecting postal vote applications. The NSW Electoral Commission recommends this prohibition extend to local government elections in addition to state elections.

Proposal 4

Require that electoral material distributed during the pre-poll voting period be registered

The Electoral Commission recommends the Act be amended to require electoral material distributed during the early voting period to be registered by the Electoral Commissioner, consistent with the requirements for electoral material distributed on election day. The NSW Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters recommended in its report "Administration of the 2023 NSW state election" that the Electoral Act be amended in this manner. Given the increasing popularity of early polling, there should be consistent rules for electoral material during the pre-polling period and on election day. This change is likely to improve compliance with electoral material legislation, minimise breaches and lessen the likelihood of voters being confused or misled by unlawful material.

Proposal 5

Ensure flexibility in providing voting to aged care and similar facilities

Section 327(1) of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021* requires the election manager to have declared by or on the nomination day, all facilities (typically aged care centres, hospitals, retirement villages) in an area that are to be a declared institution for the purpose of enabling permanent or temporary residents of the facility to vote. However, provision of voting services to aged care and similar facilities is managed locally and often requires flexibility to respond to changes in the facilities' circumstances – such as a disease outbreak. There is no time specified by which pre-poll or polling places must be appointed and it is recommended the same approach is utilised for the declaration of declared facilities.

Proposal 6

Improving voter accessibility at voting centres

It is recommended the Regulation is amended to enable voters to vote outside, but in close proximity to the polling place, if they are unable to enter the polling place due to disability. This will reduce barriers to participation for electors who are unable to enter a voting centre to cast their vote. While the Electoral Commission makes every effort to procure accessible venues, this is not always possible in every voting location, including where public schools do not make their accessible parking areas available or offer accessible toilets to the Electoral Commission on election day. It is noted the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918* (Cth) s. 234A contains provisions of this nature (see s. 234A).

Proposal 7

Processing of early votes

The Electoral Commission recommends the Act be amended to allow ballot boxes from pre-poll voting offices to be opened for the purpose of processing ballot papers from 4pm on election day. The NSW Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters in its report "Administration of the 2023 NSW state election" recommended such amendments be made to the *Electoral Act 2017* to enable ballot paper processing. Processing of ballot papers would involve unfolding and sorting ballot papers only, with no counting to take place until 6pm. The processing would occur in a secure location, and, to support the integrity of the process, it is recommended any amendments to permit processing be accompanied by offence provisions prohibiting the disclosure or use of information obtained during the processing of ballot-papers for any purpose other than conducting that processing. It is expected that such amendments will enable a greater proportion of votes to be counted on election night compared to current practice.

Proposal 8

Align local government election vote counting practices with those of state elections

The rules for counting of ballot papers are different between state and local government elections. The Electoral Commission recommends s. 348A of the Act is amended to provide that the counting place manager is to count ballot papers in the manner determined by the election manager, rather than in the manner prescribed by the Regulation. This would provide flexibility and align more closely with legislation for state elections, allowing for consistent procedures, training and communications with stakeholders across state and local government elections.

Proposal 9

Clarify that not knowing an election is being held is not a sufficient reason for failing to vote

Following the issue of penalty notices for failing to vote after an election, electors often advise that their reason for failing to vote was that they were unaware the election was being held. It is recommended the offence provision in s. 312 of the Act be amended to provide that lack of knowledge or awareness of an election is not a sufficient reason for failing to vote. In addition, the penalty notice provision, s. 314, should be similarly amended. This will assist in avoiding unnecessary litigation and costs for all parties. The NSW Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters made a recommendation in its report "Administration of the 2023 state election" that the *Electoral Act 2017* should be amended to put beyond doubt that not knowing that an election was being conducted is not a defence to the offence of failing to vote.

Proposal 10

Provide for certain offences relating to electoral material to be enforced by issuing a penalty notice

The possible enforcement options available for offences under the LG Regulation are limited to issuing a warning or commencing prosecution in court. A decision to prosecute normally results in the commencement of criminal proceedings against a person. Before the NSW Electoral Commission exercises its discretionary power to decide to prosecute, it considers, in accordance with its Prosecution Policy, factors including the following:

- the potential serious consequence of prosecution action, including a criminal conviction and liability to a penalty
- the seriousness or conversely, the triviality of the alleged offence
- the prevalence of the alleged offence in the community, whether it is of considerable public concern and the need to denounce and deter the offending behaviour
- whether the prosecution would be perceived as counter-productive
- the likely length and expense of a trial if disproportionate to the seriousness of the alleged offence.

By comparison, the *Electoral Act 2017* provides that certain comparable offences relating to electoral material identified in a schedule to the *Electoral Regulation 2018* can be enforced by issuing a penalty notice. Such offences include the printing, publishing, distribution or display of electoral material without the required authorisation being legibly shown on the material, interference with posters and displaying posters within 6 metres of a voting centre.

The issuing of a penalty notice in appropriate circumstances is an effective enforcement option that can provide general and specific deterrence and avoid the costs associated with a prosecution for both the NSW Electoral Commission and the infringing party. The option of issuing a penalty notice for appropriate offences would also bring consistency to the enforcement options available at state and local government elections for these offences.

Proposal 11

Establish new offences to prohibit audio and or video recording inside a polling place without permission and to prohibit the publication of any such recording

It is recommended two new offences under the Act are established – first, that it is an offence to record inside a polling place without the permission of the polling place manager, and second, that it is an offence to publish whole or part of the recording. Similar offence provisions have recently been passed by the Commonwealth Parliament to protect voters and polling workers from this type of disruption at federal elections. The Electoral Commission recommends these offences be aligned across state and federal elections, to the extent possible, to assist in public awareness of offences and promote consistent standards of behaviour across jurisdictions.

Proposal 12

Disclosure of information regarding the progress and outcome of investigations concerning non-compliance with the Local Government Act and Regulation

Due to prohibitions on the disclosure of information in s. 664 of the Local Government Act and s. 268 of the Electoral Act, the Electoral Commission is unable to make public any information about the progress or outcome of an investigation into a possible contravention of the electoral provisions of the Local Government Act or the Local Government (General) Regulation, even where it is in the public interest to do so.

In its report on the 2019 state general election, the JSCEM recommended that the Electoral Act be amended to require the Electoral Commission to advise complainants of the outcome of complaints made regarding non-compliance with electoral legislation. While ss. 268(2)-(4) of the Electoral Act now permit disclosures in some circumstances, these provisions do not extend to contraventions of the electoral provisions of the Local Government Act or the Local Government (General) Regulation. By contrast, the provisions do extend to contraventions of the Electoral Funding Act 2018 and Electoral Funding Regulation 2018 involving political participants at local government elections.

The Electoral Commission proposes that s 268(2)(a) & 268(3)(a) of the Electoral Act be amended to provide that, despite the general prohibition on disclosure in s 268(1), the Electoral Commission or the Electoral Commissioner may disclose information in respect of a possible contravention of the Electoral Act, "or any other Act conferring or imposing functions on the Electoral Commission or Electoral Commissioner". This would clarify the position in respect of electoral provisions of the Local Government Act and Local Government (General) Regulation and provide for consistency with the current legislative position in relation to contraventions of electoral funding legislation.

Proposal 13

Enhancing the security of enrolment information available via inspection

Section 302 of the Act requires the Electoral Commissioner to make a copy of the residential roll for an area available for public inspection. It is recommended this section specify, in alignment with s. 47 of the Electoral Act, that the residential roll is only available for inspection following its preparation for a specific election event and for a prescribed number of days post-election. It is recommended this section prohibit a person inspecting a copy of the residential roll under this section from using a device (such as a camera, mobile phone, video recorder or other electronic device) to copy, record or transmit the contents of the roll or any part of the roll, but permit a person to take hand-written notes of any of the contents. The Commission further recommends that the copy of the residential roll made available not contain any particulars relating to a person's date of birth.

Proposal 14

Protecting enrolment information provided to candidates

Provision for the Electoral Commissioner to require an undertaking

The legislation requires the election manager to provide, at the request of any candidate for election, a copy of a list of electors and their particulars. It is recommended that section 284A of the Regulation is amended to allow the NSW Electoral Commissioner to require the candidate to provide the NSW Electoral Commissioner with an undertaking that the candidate's systems and procedures are adequate to preserve the security of the information, before providing a candidate with the information. This aligns with s. 48(4) of the *Electoral Act 2017*, which enables the Commissioner to require candidates at state elections to provide such an undertaking before being provided access to enrolment information.

Timing of the provision of enrolment information to candidates

The Electoral Commission recommends that s. 284A of the Regulation be amended so candidates may only request a list of electors no later than 48 hours before the close of voting. Given the restrictions that apply to the use of enrolment information, it is unclear how lists requested and received after this time could be effectively and lawfully used by a candidate for the limited election-related permitted purposes specified in the legislation. The Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters in its report on the administration of the 2023 state election made a similar recommendation in relation to s. 49 of the *Electoral Act 2017*, to help ensure enrolment information is used only for election-related purposes.

Proposal 15

Protecting information provided to councils and electoral services providers

Provision for the Electoral Commissioner to require an undertaking

The Electoral Commission similarly recommends that s. 298 of the Act be amended to provide that before a copy of the residential roll is provided to the general manager of a council or to an electoral services provider engaged by the council, the Electoral Commissioner may require the general manager and the electoral services provider to give an undertaking that their systems and procedures are adequate to preserve the security of that information, and they will return the information to the Electoral Commissioner or destroy the information after using it for the purpose of administering an election.

It should be noted, however, that the Electoral Commission is unable to proactively monitor or audit a recipient's compliance with such an undertaking by use of its statutory enforcement powers. This is the case whether the recipient be a council, an electoral services provider or a political participant.

Protection of postal-voting information

The Regulation, s. 316(2) requires the Electoral Commissioner to provide to electoral services providers a list of registered early voters (postal) who are entitled to vote at an election in respect of a ward or area in which the electoral services provider is conducting an election. It is recommended the Electoral Commissioner instead provide this information to the relevant council's General Manager. It is further recommended the Electoral Commissioner be permitted to require the General Manager to provide an undertaking similar to that outlined above, but in respect of postal voters' information. This is particularly important given this information contains the addresses of silent electors.

Reviews and inquiries

Since the ordinary Local Government Elections in late 2021, the Electoral Commissioner participated, via formal submissions and appearances in person, in several major federal and state inquiries, and also undertook a review of technology assisted voting.

While not necessarily relating directly to the 2024 Local Government Elections, the outcomes of the below inquiries and review may impact the conduct and administration of such elections.

New South Wales Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters: Inquiry into proposals to increase voter engagement, participation and confidence

On 24 June 2024, the Special Minister of State, Hon John Graham MLC, referred the following Inquiry to the JSCEM:

That the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters inquire into and report on proposals to increase voter engagement, participation and confidence, including reforms to:

- a) Maintain confidence in the integrity of electoral processes.
- b) Strengthen the security and integrity of the electoral system.
- Reduce barriers to participation, in particular for voters with disabilities and voters from groups with historically lower enrolment and turnout rates.
- d) Implement options for technology assisted voting (TAV) as set out in the NSW Electoral Commission's November 2023 report on TAV.
- e) Improve systems for political donations, electoral funding and party governance, including as recommended in the Independent Commission Against Corruption's report on political donations facilitated by Chinese Friends of Labor in 2015 (Operation Aero).
- f) Amend electoral laws in relation to electoral funding and political parties, including in relation to:
 - i. allowable Administrative Fund expenditure under section 84 of the Electoral Funding Act 2018
 - ii. residence requirements for political party officials
 - iii. expenditure of the Election Campaigns Fund within New South Wales
- g) Any other related matters.

Close of submissions: 24 August 2024. The JSCEM must report by 30 June 2025. The Acting Electoral Commissioner Dr Matthew Phillips made a submission to the Inquiry, with a supplementary submission in early 2025 by the new Electoral Commissioner. The Electoral Commissioner and staff of the Electoral Commission were invited to appear before the Committee in March 2025. Details of Committee inquiries, including reports and submissions, are available on the NSW Parliament website.

Federal Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters: Inquiry into civics education, engagement, and participation in Australia

The Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters adopted an inquiry into civics education, engagement, and participation in Australia on 27 March 2024, following a referral from the Special Minister of State, Senator the Hon Don Farrell.

The Inquiry had regard to:

- the effectiveness of formalised civics education throughout Australia and the various approaches taken across jurisdictions through schools and other institutions including electoral commissions, councils, and parliaments; the extent to which all students have equitable access to civics education; and opportunities for improvement
- the vast array of informal mechanisms through which Australians seek and receive information about Australia's
 democracy, electoral events, and voting; and how governments and the community might leverage these
 mechanisms to improve the quality of information and help Australians be better informed about, and better
 participate in, the electoral system

- the mechanisms available to assist voters in understanding the legitimacy of information about electoral matters;
 the impact of artificial intelligence, foreign interference, social media and mis- and disinformation; and how governments and the community can prevent or limit inaccurate or false information influencing electoral outcomes
- opportunities for supporting culturally diverse, geographically diverse, and remote communities to access relevant, appropriate, and culturally suitable information about Australian democracy, electoral events, enrolment and voting to promote full electoral participation
- social, socio-economic, or other barriers that may be preventing electoral participation; and ways governments
 might address or circumvent these barriers, and
- potential improvements to the operations and structures that deliver electoral events to support full electoral participation.

The Acting Electoral Commissioner Dr Matthew Phillips made a submission to the Inquiry and appeared at a public hearing on 3 October 2024. The report of the Inquiry, which referenced the submission and evidence of the NSW Electoral Commission and made recommendations about improving civics education in Australia, was published on 6 February 2025. The report is titled "From Classroom to Community: Civics education and political participation in Australia". More information can also be found on the Parliament of Australia website.

Electoral Commissioner's review of technology assisted voting

Technology assisted voting is provided for under Division 11 of the *Electoral Act 2017*. Technology assisted voting means a method of voting where an eligible elector votes by means of an electronic device (whether networked or not), such as by telephone or computer. Currently, the legislation provides for the use of telephone assisted voting as the only form of technology assisted voting, and only for electors who are blind or have low vision.

In November 2023, the NSW Electoral Commissioner's report on the review of technology assisted voting was delivered, recommending the NSW Government consider an internet voting solution for voters who are blind or have low vision. Although the NSW Government is still considering the report's recommendations (including for legislative change), the NSW Electoral Commission required funding at the time of the 2024-25 budget to preserve the chance that internet voting could be made available at the 2027 NSW State election. The timing for funding was to finalise market testing and collaborate with disability reference group stakeholders in the co-design of a new system. Funding was not provided as part of the 2024-25 budget process and so it is now not feasible to provide this voting channel in 2027 and likely not in 2028.

The NSW Electoral Commissioner's 2023 *Technology Assisted Voting – Final review* report is published on the NSW Electoral Commission website, along with public submissions to the review and other information. The new Electoral Commissioner notes that at the Western Australian state general election held on 8 March 2025, the electoral commission there made available a form of internet voting via telephone for voters who are visually impaired, have some other physical impairment or have reading difficulties. The NSW Electoral Commissioner looks forward to understanding more about how that system was provided and whether it successfully met user expectations and integrity requirements.

Regulatory priorities

Supporting electoral integrity and efficient regulatory effort

The regulatory priorities highlight where strategic regulatory efforts of the Electoral Commission will, subject to its budgetary constraints, be directed during the year to optimise the efficiency and value of its legislated regulatory function and ensure responses to non-compliance are targeted and proportionate. They are informed by a risk-based assessment of legislated regulatory functions and anticipated events.

2024-25 strategic regulatory focus

The 2024-25 priorities have a focus on the 2024 Local Government elections, including education to support compliance by political participants in the elections, greater transparency by publishing information about enforcement activities, and upholding the integrity of electoral processes and safe elections. The Electoral Commission's five regulatory priorities for 2024-25 are grouped under the three themes of 1) education, 2) transparency and 3) free and fair election:

Education to support compliance by political participants

- Deliver focused education initiatives for election participants and provide relevant and timely information to support their compliance
- Support compliance by political participants in the 2024 Local Government elections (candidates, groups, political
 parties, third-party campaigners, donors and scrutineers) and any state and local government by-elections during
 the period, through initiatives that raise awareness about the regulatory obligations that apply to elections in New
 South Wales
- Support privacy by educating authorised recipients of enrolment information about managing personal data securely
- Support privacy protection of enrolment details by:
- raising awareness about proper handling of enrolment information provided under statute to political parties and candidates, including expectations for destroying or returning information after an election
- updating provision and destruction arrangements with other authorised users of enrolment information.

Greater transparency to maintain integrity, trust and confidence

- Improve the transparency of our enforcement activities to raise awareness among political participants about their obligations and to reduce future non-compliance
- Publish information about levels of compliance with disclosure obligations and enforcement actions taken in response to failure to lodge a disclosure by the due date for political participants at the 2024 Local Government elections.

Delivering safe, free and fair elections

- Uphold the integrity of elections by responding in a timely manner to material that may mislead the community about electoral processes in New South Wales
- Support the integrity of elections by:
- researching the use and regulation of artificial intelligence (AI) in the creation and dissemination of mis/disinformation in elections
- maintaining the disinformation register on the Electoral Commission's website and continuing to correct misleading or inaccurate information about the electoral process and the regulation of elections
- · ensuring the clear attribution of electoral material published online, where election law requires it
- taking steps to ensure that electoral material (including postal vote applications distributed by political participants) does not mislead voters by suggesting it is official communication from the Electoral Commission
- engaging with other regulators to develop and embed protocols for responding to unlawful material or content that is mis/disinformation about an election.
- Support voting in person at elections in New South Wales to be safe and free of interference, including for election officials working at polling places

- Support voting in person to be safe and without interference by:
 - expanding training and education for staff and voters to include interference and safety challenges at voting centres
 - embedding a clear escalation path for responding to interference and safety challenges at voting centres, including through engaging directly with NSW Police
 - recording incidents to support future risk-management strategies.

Information about how these regulatory priorities were implemented for the 2024 NSW Local Government election is included throughout this report.

Funding and financial management

Funding the 2024 NSW Local Government elections

Councils are required to meet the costs of conducting their elections as provided for under their statutory agreements with the NSW Electoral Commissioner. For this election, and the 2021 ordinary elections and the 2016-17 split ordinary elections, the NSW Government also allocated additional funding to the Electoral Commission to cover the 'core costs' of being an election service provider for local government. These 'core costs' are predominantly the additional expenditure required for the NSW Electoral Commission to plan and prepare for the delivery and regulation of state-wide elections.

At the time of this report, the total costs for the elections (core and council) are still being finalised. This is because it takes several months after a statewide election for all suppliers' invoices to be received and processed by the NSW Electoral Commission. Changes made to award wages are also still being actioned for temporary staff. At 25 February 2025, however, the forecast spend for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections was \$122.8 million. Approximately 45 per cent of the final costs will be recovered from councils.

Increasing costs of council elections

The NSW Electoral Commission acknowledges that the cost of elections, for local councils and for the state, has increased. The increase in costs has been driven over the last few years by a range of factors, some of which are outside of the control of the NSW Electoral Commission. These factors may include the implementation of new electoral laws and the need to meet contemporary expectations about electoral integrity. Many others are the product of changing external environments, to which the whole economy is subject, including above-CPI increases to many major cost items. Some specific increases that impact the cost of local government elections include:

- the cost of election venue hire particularly through reliance on commercial leases
- rising postal and courier charges
- increased staff numbers to meet legal and work health and safety requirements
- increased staff numbers to support voter expectations for reduced wait times at voting centres
- security personnel to ensure safety and integrity of the elections
- increasing logistics costs, rising 10 per cent year-on-year, for example
 - the fuel surcharge has increased to 40 per cent
 - materials and equipment costs continue to be impacted by global supply chain issues
- increased costs of maintaining critical but legacy election information technology systems, such as the proportional representation count system
- the extension of the postal vote return period to align with state and federal postal voting has increased staffing costs and venue rental costs.

The NSW Electoral Commission will continue to review ways in which it can deliver and regulate elections as efficiently as possible.

Election programme management

Delivering an election requires focused planning and preparation. As noted elsewhere in this report, this work must start well in advance of election day. The 2024 NSW Local Government elections, as with all recent statewide elections, were approached as a coordinated programme of work broken up into various project delivery streams.

The NSW Electoral Commission's Enterprise Portfolio Management Office provided support and assurance services to the project teams, the governance framework, monitoring progress during the design, development, operational readiness, go-live and closure phases of the projects. Working Groups were established to provide specialist input.

Management and leadership of service delivery was transferred to the Election Operations Group from the Enterprise Portfolio Management Office during the operational phase of the elections.

The post-election review process identified areas of good practice and opportunities for improvement.

Collaboration with other public sector agencies

The preparation and delivery of an election requires a high level of coordination and planning. To ensure access to relevant information and resources, the NSW Electoral Commission collaborated with key government agencies, including:

- NSW Premier's Department and The Cabinet Office
- NSW Police Force
- Office of Local Government NSW
- NSW Department of Education
- Australian Electoral Commission.

Representatives from Fairfield City and Liverpool City councils (the councils that did not engage the NSW Electoral Commissioner to run their elections) were also invited to participate in meetings where the Office of Local Government and/or NSW Police were attending, to ensure consistent understanding of factors across all elections being held.

The electoral roll and enrolment

Residential electoral roll

Under the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918, the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) has the responsibility for maintaining the Commonwealth electoral roll. Each of the Australian states and territories has a Joint Roll Arrangement with the AEC for the Commonwealth roll to form the basis of each of the rolls used by the state and territory electoral commissions.

Enrolment for the 2024 NSW Local Government election "closed" at 6pm on Monday, 5 August 2024. Enrolments are closed only for the purposes of nominating as a candidate or being a nominator of a candidate and for the printing of paper rolls that are used in polling places. People can still enrol at any time after the close of enrolment, including enrolling and voting on election day (an enrolment vote). For the 2024 NSW Local Government election, the residential roll for a council area was the list of people who live in the specific council area and are eligible to vote in elections.

- The number of electors on the residential roll at the close of rolls was 5,628,786.
- A total of 5,242,086 electors were enrolled in council areas/wards that had contested elections conducted by the NSW Electoral Commissioner (the number excludes uncontested council/ward elections).

Non-residential electoral roll

There are two non-residential rolls:

- the roll of non-resident owners of rateable land
- the roll of occupiers and rate-paying lessees.

These two rolls are combined with the residential roll to form the roll of electors for a council area, which is used during an election. The non-residential rolls provide people who are non-resident owners, occupiers and rate-paying lessees of rateable land within the council area an opportunity to have a say in who is elected to council.

It is the responsibility of the general manager of each council to maintain the roll of non-resident owners of rateable land and the roll of occupiers and rate-paying lessees. After each election, the non-residential rolls lapse. Then as soon as is practicable, the general manager prepares new rolls for the next election and keeps them updated.

Provision of the list of electors

Local council candidates

Section 284A of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021* entitles candidates upon request to the NSW Electoral Commissioner to be provided with enrolment information for the relevant ward or area.

Once nominated, local government candidates may request an electronic list of electors enrolled for the ward or area for which they are a candidate. The list of electors contains the name and address of electors (the postal address where provided) and other particulars of electors entitled to vote in the election, but it does not contain the address of any silent electors.

Privacy and security of enrolment information

The NSW Electoral Commission's 2024-25 regulatory priority number two is focussed on supporting privacy by educating authorised recipients of enrolment information about managing personal data securely.

Recipients of enrolment information must protect the security and privacy of any enrolment information provided to them. Before being provided with a list of electors, recipients are requested to provide an undertaking in writing to the Electoral Commission that they have adequate systems and procedures to preserve the security of that information. There is no legislative obligation to do so under the Local Government Act but the NSW Electoral Commission is requesting an amendment to section 284A to align with state elections. The Electoral Commission provides guidance to recipients about the minimum standards it would consider adequate, but it does not have any role in auditing or investigating compliance with those standards unless there is an allegation of unlawful disclosure of the relevant information.

It is an offence for a candidate to use the list of electors other than for a purpose permitted in connection with their candidacy at the election. It is also an offence to disclose the list of electors other than for a permitted purpose, or to use the information for a commercial purpose, or to sell or offer the information for sale. There are significant penalties for candidates or others using a list of electors for any reason other than a permitted purpose.

At the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the NSW Electoral Commission received written requests from 98 candidates for copies of the relevant enrolment information for the wards or areas being contested. These candidates had not previously received copies of the relevant enrolment information. Once the election results had been declared, all candidates who had received copies of enrolment information were required to confirm that they had stopped using that information and had destroyed all copies of the information. Compliance with this requirement continues to be monitored.

City of Newcastle Ward 3 data breach

Regrettably, a printed authorised roll used to mark off electors during the local council elections for the City of Newcastle Ward 3 was raised as unaccounted for following the pack-down of a polling place after close of voting on election day. The data of 30,971 electors and non-residential electors (non-resident owners, occupiers and ratepaying lessees of rateable land) in City of Newcastle Ward 3 was printed on the roll as follows:

- Elector identification number#
- Full name
- Residential address for electors (not included for silent electors*). For non-residential electors this is the address that applies for their non-residential elector status.
- Date of Birth (not included for silent electors*).
- Sex of the enrolled person (as the letter 'F' or 'M').

An example of information on the electoral roll:

- Full name
- Sex (as the letter 'F' or 'M').

[#]This is a unique number used by the NSW Electoral Commission to identify electors for administrative purposes. It does not appear on ID documents and cannot be used for ID verification purposes.

The NSW Electoral Commission worked closely with the NSW Police and the NSW Privacy Commissioner to take appropriate action. The individuals affected were contacted directly by mail, with details of the information that was available on the missing roll and guidance about protective steps they could take in response to this unfortunate breach. In addition to the letter, in accordance with section 59P(4) of the *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998*, the NSW Electoral Commission published a notification of the roll data breach on its public notification register, available on its website.

Further, the NSW Electoral Commission took the following steps to publicise the notification and list the contact points for the public notification register on the website:

- Publishing a notice on the Electoral Commission's official Facebook page, including a link to the notification register, and boosting same to relevant postcodes in order to maximise engagement by platform users in the Newcastle area.
- Publishing an update to a previous media statement (of 8 October 2024), noting the public notification register.

• Publishing the 'City of Newcastle Ward 3 – data breach FAQs' webpage, including a link to the public notification register from the NSW Electoral Commission's 'Privacy' landing page, which is accessible from the website footer on every page of the Electoral Commission's website.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, a total of 10,739 printed rolls were distributed. All of these printed rolls were signed back in and accounted for, with the exception of this one printed roll in City of Newcastle Ward 3. Despite this sound security record, and the fact there is no indication of any consequential misuse of the personal information in the missing roll, the Electoral Commission regrets causing any anxiety or any other concern for the electors in Ward 3.

The validity of the City of Newcastle election results was not impacted. All votes taken at the polling place where the roll was used were counted on election night and continued through the usual ballot tracking and counting and results processes. The Acting Electoral Commissioner determined that as the printed roll was not available to check which electors were marked off at that polling place, electors in Ward 3 would not be issued with 'Apparent failure to vote notices' for this election.

The NSW Electoral Commission is reviewing its processes for opportunities to strengthen security processes around the management of printed rolls.

Misinformation and disinformation

Globally, the conversation continues about misinformation and disinformation in the context of elections and democratic society more broadly. The NSW Electoral Commission follows and participates in these discussions so it remains aware of fundamental issues impacting trust in elections. At the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the Electoral Commission again implemented strategies to mitigate the risks of misinformation/disinformation and preserve trust in the electoral system.

What is disinformation and misinformation?

The Electoral Commission considers that misinformation is false information spread due to ignorance, or by error or mistake, without the intent to deceive. Disinformation is knowingly false information designed to deliberately mislead and influence public opinion or obscure the truth for malicious or deceptive purposes.

Disinformation Register

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the Electoral Commission again placed a specific focus on countering the threats to election integrity from online disinformation and misinformation. In particular, an online *Disinformation Register*, developed for the 2023 NSW State election (based on a similar register used by the Australian Electoral Commission at the 2022 federal election), was used to track and rebut significant false and misleading statements about electoral processes in New South Wales.

Seven items of disinformation were added to the Register during the 2024 NSW Local Government elections period. The Disinformation Register can be viewed on the NSW Electoral Commission's website. Again, the Electoral Commission takes care not to attribute the disinformation to a specific person or organisation or post to prevent any perception of partiality and to avoid the risk of platforming or amplifying the poster or disinformation.

Context of the Register

The NSW Electoral Commission provides reliable and accurate information to the general public, electors and political participants about New South Wales electoral processes. The Electoral Commission can investigate the compliance of electoral communications with legislative requirements and take enforcement action where breaches have occurred. It is a function of the Electoral Commission to promote public awareness of electoral matters that are in the public interest by means of education and information programs. The NSW Electoral Commission does not investigate or enforce truth in political advertising more generally because there are no general truth in political advertising laws in NSW.

Structure of the Register

Each entry to the Register contained the following elements:

- Disinformation: A summary of the disinformation identified.
- Correct information: A summary of the relevant correct information.
- NSW Electoral Commission action: A summary of the action taken to counter the false claim, including relevant links.
- Date detected: The month and year in which the false claim was detected.
- Source: Where the false claim was seen.

Threshold for inclusion of entries on the Register

For an entry to be made in the Register, the relevant information must be assessed by the Electoral Commission as:

- concerning the administration or delivery of an electoral event or process for which the Electoral Commission is responsible under legislation
- objectively false or identified as a known tactic for spreading disinformation in a way that is deliberately leading to objectively false conclusions
- · harmful to perceptions of electoral integrity for consumers of that information, and
- of significant enough reach or harm to potentially impact individuals outside of a small or closed communications community and their understanding of electoral processes.

To avoid amplifying or platforming the views of any specific individual or organisation during an election campaign period, or creating any perception of partiality, the Electoral Commission did not republish the disinformation itself.

Responding to reports received about disinformation

Members of the public and election participants were able to bring items they considered to be disinformation and misinformation about electoral processes to the attention of the Electoral Commissioner, through the Commission's website. These notifications were considered by the Electoral Commissioner, to determine whether the information should be included on the Register. The Electoral Commission can only investigate and take enforcement action in relation to electoral material where there is a potential breach of NSW electoral law.

Disruption campaigns against the Electoral Commission and subsequent legislative amendments

During the 2023 NSW State election, the Electoral Commission was the target of a disruption campaign, similar to campaigns experienced overseas and in other Australian electoral jurisdictions. Disruptive material was disseminated online and there were attempts by members of the public to make personal contact with staff.

The transfer of full early voting ballot boxes to district election managers' offices during the NSW 2023 State election period became a focus of particular commentary online. The Electoral Commission relies on temporary election staff from the local community in hundreds of voting locations to make their private vehicles available to assist in this ballot box transfer process. Some candidate supporters were encouraged to film these election staff undertaking these ordinary ballot paper box movements using their private vehicles. Some made verbal allegations, while following and filming staff, that they were committing criminal offences, which were then amplified after these recordings were posted online.

In the <u>Electoral Commissioner's Report on the administration of the 2023 NSW State election</u>, a recommendation was made to Government to give consideration to a new offence that would make it unlawful for a person to film, photograph or seriously harass an election official in the course of carrying out their duties. A criminal offence could be a strong public statement of support for continued orderly election administration and the integrity of the NSW electoral system.

The Electoral Commission appreciates that there is a constitutional freedom of political communication in Australia that can only be burdened by legislation where is it reasonable and proportionate to do so, however, it is imperative that voters can safely participate in elections and that election workers are protected while delivering elections in New South Wales.

In response, at the request of the former Electoral Commissioner, the *Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024* made changes to the conduct of local government elections that took effect for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections; namely:

- it is now an offence to film or photograph election officials and scrutineers while performing their duties, in a way that would likely make the official or scrutineer feel intimidated or harassed
- election managers (state elections) and polling place managers (local government elections) now have the ability to give health and safety directions at any election or place where voting is occurring.

While the Electoral Commission had escalation pathways in place with social media platforms, it did not experience the level of disruption at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections as was seen at the 2023 NSW State election.

Registration of political participants

The NSW Electoral Commission is responsible for the registration of electoral participants under the *Electoral Funding Act 2018*. The Act prescribes the registration of candidates, groups of candidates, and third-party campaigners for electoral funding purposes and the rules for the management and disclosure of political donations and electoral expenditure.

Information in this report about the requirement for registration for electoral funding purposes (accepting political donations and incurring electoral expenditure) applies to all candidates and other participants in the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, including those for Fairfield City Council and Liverpool City Council (these two councils did not engage the NSW Electoral Commissioner to conduct their elections). Offences under local government electoral laws at all council elections are also enforced by the NSW Electoral Commission.

Funding and Disclosure Online

Political participants were able to register, update their registered details, appoint an official agent and lodge disclosures online using the Electoral Commission's Funding and Disclosure Online portal. Since the portal was first made available for the (deferred) 2021 Local Government elections it has been expanded to allow all political participants to register for electoral funding and campaign finance purposes, and party or official agents to be appointed online. Funding and Disclosure Online seeks to meet community expectations around the role of technology in the electoral context, both for service delivery and regulatory functions.

There are currently more than 6,000 registered users of the system following a significant increase in use during the candidate registration process for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

Registration of candidates, groups of candidates, third-party campaigners and parties

Candidates and groups of candidates

Candidates and groups of candidates were required to be registered for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections under the *Electoral Funding Act 2018* before accepting political donations or making payments for electoral expenditure. The registration of a candidate or group for campaign finance purposes is a separate process to the candidate or group being nominated for the election and have their respective names printed on the ballot paper.

Councillors seeking re-election did not need to be registered for campaign finance purposes before accepting political donations or making payments for electoral expenditure.

Candidates and groups were able to register through the NSW Electoral Commission's *Funding and Disclosure Online* system or by requesting a printed version of the registration form. A total of 1,644 candidates and 189 groups registered online. A total of 78 candidates and 13 groups registered using the manual, paper-based process.

Any candidates and groups who were nominated but not registered before being nominated were taken to be registered when they were nominated on the day after the close of nominations. From the day after the close of nominations, all nominated candidates and groups could lawfully accept political donations and make payments for electoral expenditure for the election.

Third-party campaigners

A third-party campaigner is a person or entity (other than a political party, candidate, group of candidates, elected member, or associated entity) that incurred more than \$2,000 in electoral expenditure for an election in a local government area during the capped expenditure period, which began on 1 July 2024 and ended on election day.

Electoral expenditure incurred by a third-party campaigner is expenditure that has the dominant purpose of promoting or opposing a political party or candidate or influencing the vote at an election.

Third-party campaigners were able to register using *Funding and Disclosure Online* or by requesting a paper form. When registering, a third-party campaigner was also required to appoint an official agent responsible for managing and disclosing the third-party campaigner's political donations and electoral expenditure. This includes operating a campaign account on behalf of the third-party campaigner.

Third-party campaigners were required to be registered for the elections in a local government area before paying for electoral expenditure.

The details of registered candidates, groups, third-party campaigners, and official agents are included in publicly available registers published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

Registrations for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections

The following tables shows the number of registrations received (and cancelled) by category for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

Note: These figures include registrations for Fairfield City and Liverpool City councils that are not included in the nominations data. Candidates who registered for both mayoral and councillor are counted twice in these numbers.

Not all candidates who registered proceeded to nomination, but all nominated candidates must be registered. This means the number of candidate registrations does not necessarily equal the number of candidate nominations.

Registered political parties

The NSW Electoral Commissioner maintains publicly available registers of political parties. Extracts from the registers are published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website. Parties are registered for local government elections under the *Local Government Act 1993* and for state elections under the *Electoral Act 2017*. Parties registered for state elections are also registered for local government elections.

Forty-five (45) political parties in total were registered for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. This includes the 31 parties on the local government register of parties and the 14 parties registered for state elections, as shown in the following two tables.

Local government register of political parties

Thirty-one (31) parties were registered for local government elections under the *Local Government Act* 1993, an increase of two parties compared to the twenty-nine (29) at the 2021 NSW Local Government elections.

Caps on electoral expenditure

The Small Business Party

Electoral expenditure for these elections was capped, meaning there was a limit on the amount of expenditure that could be incurred during the capped expenditure period by political parties, candidates, groups of candidates, and third-party campaigners.

The legislated caps are based on the number of enrolled electors in each local government area or ward as determined by the NSW Electoral Commissioner. The capped expenditure period began on 1 July 2024 and finished on election day, 14 September 2024. Registered candidates, group of candidates, and third-party campaigners were notified of the number of enrolled electors in their area or ward and the specific expenditure caps that applied to them.

Information on the number of enrolled electors and applicable caps in each area and ward is available on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

Caps on political donations

Political donations made to political parties, elected members, candidates, groups of candidates, associated entities, and third-party campaigners are capped in New South Wales. The caps on political donations are adjusted for inflation each financial year. In summary, the donation caps that applied at the elections are:

- \$7,900 cap from 1 July 2024 for any political donation to, or for the benefit of, a registered party or a group of candidates
- \$3,800 cap from 1 July 2024 for any political donation to, or for the benefit of:
 - a party that is not a registered party, or
 - an elected member, or
 - a candidate, or
 - a third-party campaigner.

Political donations accepted from the same donor by the same recipient in a financial year are to be aggregated for the purpose of the donation caps. Donations accepted from the same donor by elected members, candidates, and groups of candidates endorsed by the same party in a financial year are to be aggregated for the purposes of the donation caps.

Donations to candidates, groups, and elected members of the same party are to be aggregated separately for local government elections and other purposes.

More information about the political donation rules and caps is published on the Electoral Commission's website.

Disclosure of political donations and electoral expenditure

Registered candidates, groups of candidates, councillors and mayors, political parties, third-party campaigners, associated entities and major political donors are required under the *Electoral Funding Act 2018* to disclose their political donations and electoral expenditure to the NSW Electoral Commission.

Awareness of, and compliance with, disclosure obligation requirements is promoted to stakeholders in a range of ways prior to, during, and following each of the disclosure lodgement periods. Such promotion includes updates to the NSW Electoral Commission's website, webinars, the publication of election bulletins and Candidate handbooks at elections, fact sheets, direct email, SMS, and social media updates on the Electoral Commission's various platforms. Disclosures can be made to the Electoral Commission using the *Funding and Disclosure Online* system, or by paper form if the portal cannot be used.

The following disclosures are required:

- political donations made and received, and electoral expenditure incurred, by candidates, groups of candidates, elected members, political parties, third-party campaigners, and associated entities.
- electoral expenditure incurred during a capped expenditure period, and political donations received (for the purpose of making payments for that electoral expenditure) by third-party campaigners.
- reportable political donations made by major political donors.

The following disclosures are required for disclosure periods up to and including the end of the 2024-25 financial year:

- half-yearly disclosure of political donations (1 July- 31 December 2024) due 11 February 2025
- half-yearly disclosure of political donations (1 January 2025-30 June 2025) due 11 August 2025
- annual major political donor disclosure (1 July 2024-30 June 2025) due 11 August 2025
- annual disclosure of electoral expenditure (1 July 2024-30 June 2025) due 22 September 2025.

Candidates must make disclosures even if they were not elected. Also, many will be required to make more than one disclosure for each disclosure period. For example, a lead candidate of a group of candidates who was elected will need to submit three disclosures: as an individual candidate, as the lead candidate on behalf of the group, and as an elected member.

Disclosures are published on the Electoral Commission's website. The following table lists the number of 2024-25 financial year disclosures due (including those for the 2024 Local Government elections) by participant category.

By improving the transparency of enforcement activities the NSW Electoral Commission hopes to raise awareness among political participants about their obligations and reduce future non-compliance. Using the February 2025 disclosures that were due for political participants at the 2024 Local Government elections, the Electoral Commission intends to publish specific information about levels of compliance with those disclosure obligations, as well as enforcement actions taken in response to failure to lodge.

Candidate and group nominations

Candidate nominations - councillor and mayoral contests

The Local Government Act 1993 sets out the process for the nomination of candidates and groups.

Candidate nominations, requests to form a group and payment of the nomination deposit could be completed online (see Nomination Online Management System below). Candidates and registered political parties could alternatively lodge their completed paper nominations, group forms and nomination deposits directly with the returning officer. In the case where a council shared a returning officer's office (a regional returning officer's office), nomination forms could be lodged at designated council offices.

A total of 3,888 candidate nominations were accepted (out of the 3,997 nominations lodged) for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections (compared with 3,865 accepted for the 2021 NSW Local Government elections). Of the 3,888 candidate nominations accepted:

- 3,737 nominations were accepted for candidates contesting councillor positions (96 per cent of total nominations)
- 151 nominations were accepted for candidates contesting mayor positions (4 per cent of total nominations)
- 36 per cent of candidate nomination forms were lodged with errors requiring correction
- of those, 42 per cent were lodged manually and 34 per cent were online nominations
- · 49 per cent of all candidate nominations were lodged in the last two and a half days of the lodgement period
- 2,902 councillor candidates were members of a group
- 739 nominations for groups of candidates were accepted.

A nomination was rejected by the NSW Electoral Commission if mandatory information was omitted from a nomination form. Of the 78 nominations rejected:

- 34 nomination forms were incomplete at the legislated close of nominations (12 noon on Wednesday, 14 August 2024), including missing section(s)/page(s), incomplete forms or candidate and/or nominator signatures missing
- 27 nominations were rejected due to the candidate information sheet not signed by an authorised witness

- 10 nominations were rejected because the candidate was not on roll prior to close of rolls for the purpose of being nominated
- seven nominations were rejected due to insufficient eligible nominators.

Nomination Online Management System

Ahead of the 2019 NSW State election, the Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters (JSCEM) recommended the introduction of an online system to make it easier for candidates and parties to submit their nomination forms, and to streamline the processing of this information by the NSW Electoral Commission. In response to this recommendation, the NSW Electoral Commission developed the *Nomination Online Management System*, which was first implemented for the 2019 NSW State election.

The Nomination Online Management System was further refined for use at the 2021 NSW Local Government elections, 2023 NSW State election and again for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. The system enables candidates and registered political parties to prepare documentation in advance of the opening of the nomination period to ensure all mandatory information was provided and applicants were verified against the electoral roll. These documents were then lodged online with the nomination deposit. Of the total nominations lodged for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, 82 per cent were lodged online.

As noted in previous election reports, the *Nomination Online Management System* reduces the administrative burden on electoral participants and supports the process of complying with legislation. It also reduces the risk of errors being introduced when information is entered manually from paper forms into the election systems, which is particularly important for candidate names on ballot papers. Other benefits of using the *Nomination Online Management System* include:

- the enrolment of candidates and nominators is automatically verified
- ensures all compulsory sections of the nomination form are completed
- enables candidates and/or registered political parties, administrators and groups to oversee and manage the progress of each nomination
- allows for the nomination forms and deposit to be lodged online
- provides automated messaging between the NSW Electoral Commission and the candidate or party with regards to the acceptance or rejection of each nomination.

Candidates were encouraged to use the online system where possible and to not leave their nomination lodgement until the end of the nominations period. Although it is the responsibility of every candidate to lodge nomination papers that are correct in full prior to the strict closing deadline, lodging early increased the chances of NSW Electoral Commission officers noting errors or omissions in time for candidates to rectify these prior to close of nominations.

The online system was demonstrated to parties and candidates and a helpdesk established (see *Candidate helpdesk* section for more information) to address concerns or problems with using the system.

There were challenges in the lead-up to the 2024 NSW Local Government elections in making the necessary changes in time, following the system's use at the 2023 NSW State election. It is likely that more significant investment will be needed prior to the next state general election in 2027 and the next local government ordinary elections in 2028. The Electoral Commission had also hoped to be able to offer a more seamless online experience for election participants at those elections as part of its digital modernisation program but funding for the program was not provided in the State budget for 2024-25 and the modernisation team has had to be disbanded. It is not yet clear what if any new or modified online services can be provided at the next ordinary elections.

Candidate demographics

While not a requirement for nomination, the Electoral Commission collects (optional disclosure) some demographic information and other statistical data from candidates. For example, for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections:

- 1,667 candidates identify as female
- · 2,232 candidates identify as male
- 1,530 candidates contested the previous ordinary council elections (December 2021)
- 165 candidates identify as having Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander background
- 185 candidates identify as living with disability

- 56 candidates with Arabic as first language
- 19 candidates with Cantonese as first language
- 59 candidates with Mandarin as first language
- 928 candidates when nominated were in the age range 50 to 59 years.

See Appendix B for further demographic data.

Party request for extension of the nomination period

The Liberal Party of Australia, New South Wales Division requested an extension of the nomination period from 12 noon on Wednesday, 14 August to Wednesday, 21 August 2024.

Dr Matthew Phillips, Acting NSW Electoral Commissioner at the time, responded that it was not possible to lawfully extend the nomination period in line with the request and, even if it was, it would not be appropriate to do so in the circumstances, including because of the very significant ramifications any extension of the nomination period would have for the conduct of the elections. More information is available in a statement published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website, including the correspondence received from the party.

Electoral material

What is electoral material?

Electoral material produced for elections in New South Wales can be in printed or electronic format. Examples of electoral material are: 'how-to-vote' cards; advertising in newspapers, on radio or TV; social media posts by election participants; bulk emails and letters sent to electors; posters; leaflets; and stickers.

Electoral material must not state or imply it is an official communication from the NSW Electoral Commissioner or the NSW Electoral Commission. This can include giving a misleading impression created through the use of colours or other visual design features.

Electoral material produced, published, distributed or displayed during the *regulated period* for an election must comply with the rules set out in legislation. Breaking these rules during the regulated period is a criminal offence, and the NSW Electoral Commission monitors and enforces compliance. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the regulated period was from Monday, 5 August to 6pm on election day Saturday, 14 September. The rules that applied to electoral material for these elections are set out in the Division 9A of Part 11 of the *Local Government (General Regulation)* 2021.

The Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024 added requirements about the placement and legibility of names and addresses in authorisation text on social media posts which constitute electoral material.

Registration of electoral material

Electoral material for distribution on election day must be registered with the NSW Electoral Commission. Copies of registered electoral material for the 2024 Local Government elections were published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

An online system was available for the registration of electoral material for distribution on election day. Items could also be manually lodged or by email.

In total, 3,997 pieces of electoral material were submitted for registration. Of this, 3,871 items were lodged using the online system and 126 items were lodged via the paper-based manual process.

- 2,137 pieces of electoral material were approved, of which:
- 1,740 items were about candidates for councillor elections
- 56 items were about candidates for mayor elections
- 304 items were for mayor and councillor
- 18 items contained multi-contest instructions, including referendum and polls
- 19 were considered generic material (that is, they did not contain "vote 1" directions for a candidate).

- 1,860 pieces of electoral material were rejected or withdrawn, of which:
- 1,562 items were about candidates for councillor elections
- 29 were about candidates for mayor elections
- 229 were for mayor and councillor
- 17 contained voting instructions for more than one contest, including referendum and poll
- 23 were considered generic material.

The majority of rejections were due to:

- applicants not representing the ballot paper correctly; for example, not providing a clear representation of the
 ballot paper, spelling errors in candidate names, and not showing the correct independent status or registered party
 name next to the candidate.
- voting directions not clear or likely to confuse an elector; for example, voting directions do not direct an elector to cast a formal vote.

Display of electoral material

All registered electoral material was displayed on the NSW Electoral Commission's website progressively from Monday, 26 August until 6:30pm election day.

The NSW Electoral Commission encouraged registered electoral materials be made accessible by political participants to enable the use of assistive technology by electors such as screen readers. The NSW Electoral Commission provided a guide to creating accessible documents.

Other compliance requirements for electoral material

The NSW Electoral Commission may and did provide guidance on whether electoral material complies with the requirements of NSW electoral laws, but it does not provide legal advice. Election participants were encouraged to seek their own legal advice before producing electoral material if they had any concerns about its legality.

Political parties, candidates, candidate and party workers, individuals, organisations and community groups must also comply with any other laws about the placement, display or distribution of electoral material in relation to roads, telegraph poles, private and public property and other public spaces regulated by authorities such as local councils and public utilities.

Voting channels

The voting options (channels) available to electors for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections were:

- in-person voting before election day (pre-poll) during the early voting period (subject to eligibility)
- telephone assisted voting for electors who are blind or have low vision
- postal voting (subject to eligibility)
- in-person voting on election day
- declared institution voting at appointed venues.

Early voting (pre-poll) and postal voting eligibility

An elector was eligible to cast an early vote or a postal vote for any of the following reasons:

- will be outside your ward or council area on election day
- will be more than 8km from a polling place in your ward or council area on election day
- will be travelling and unable to attend a polling place on election day
- are a resident in a hospital, aged care facility or retirement village (postal voting only)
- are seriously ill or infirm, and due to such illness or infirmity will be unable to attend a polling place
- are approaching maternity
- have religious membership or beliefs that prevent you from attending a polling place on election day
- are in a correctional centre and prevented from attending a polling place on election day
- are caring for a person outside of a hospital setting, which prevents you from attending a polling place on election day
- will be working on election day
- are a silent elector
- are a person with a disability
- believe that attending a polling place on election day will place your personal safety or the safety of your family at risk
- are self isolating because of COVID-19 (postal voting only)
- believes that attending a polling place on election day will place the personal safety of the person or of members of the person's family at risk.

Early voting (pre-poll) in-person

Pre-poll voting was available from Saturday, 7 September to Friday, 13 September 2024 (closed Sunday, 8 September). Pre-poll locations were available in every council area where an election was conducted by the NSW Electoral Commission.

Changes made by the Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024 that came into effect for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections reduced the pre-poll period to a period beginning seven days before election day (previously 11 days).

All pre-poll voting locations and their accessibility rating were published on the NSW Electoral Commission website.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, 1,500,237 ordinary votes were issued during the pre-poll period. It is difficult to compare this with the 2021 NSW Local Government elections because those elections were conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic and iVote (internet voting) was available and used by significantly more voters than previously. The number of pre-poll votes issued for the 2024 Local Government elections, however, was 449,324 more than the number issued in 2021.

Telephone assisted voting

Technology assisted voting was provided in the form of telephone assisted voting for electors who are blind or have low vision.

To maintain the secrecy of a telephone vote, the NSW Electoral Commission uses a two-step process: (i) registration and (ii) voting.

A registration operator confirmed the elector's eligibility and personal details and issued a unique registration number. A second operator recorded the vote, using only the unique registration number to identify the elector.

This separation ensured that the voting operator could not personally identify the elector. The voting operator verifies the accuracy of the preferences recorded by reading them back to the elector before placing the ballot paper in the ballot box.

Voting steps were monitored from end-to-end by another election official to support the overall integrity of the process.

For the 2024 Local Government elections a total of 760 electors registered for telephone assisted voting and 749 electors cast a vote using telephone assisted voting.

Postal voting

Electors could apply for a postal vote online, by downloading and printing an application form, or by contacting the Electoral Commission's call centre. All paper postal vote applications were processed through the Centralised Postal Vote Count Centre located in Sydney. See the following table for the methods utilised for postal vote application.

Centralised postal vote processing

The Centralised Postal Vote Count Centre (CPVCC) facilitated all aspects of postal voting, including the processing of paper postal vote applications, receipt of postal vote packs, scrutiny of postal vote certificates and counting postal vote ballot papers.

The centralisation of these processes provided consistency of approach in the processing of postal votes across New South Wales. In addition, the redirection of processing of postal votes from the returning officers to the centralised operations unit reduced the effort required by each of the returning officers, enabling them to focus on their specific local operations during the election period.

Postal vote scrutiny and analysis

To comply with legislated requirements when casting a postal vote, an elector is required to complete a postal vote certificate. The postal vote certificate is unique to each elector and includes the local government area and/or ward in which they are enrolled, their name and enrolled address and other administrative information including a security question and answer that must be answered correctly on the postal vote certificate for electors who applied online. This is used in place of a signature match for a paper application. The elector must sign and date the postal vote certificate in the presence of a witness. The postal vote certificate is also signed and dated by the witness. This must occur on or before 6pm on election day.

The initial scrutiny of postal vote certificates included examination by election officials of the postal vote certificate and data entry of this information to determine if the accompanying ballot papers were to be accepted for further scrutiny. If accepted, election officials then removed the ballot papers and prepared the ballot papers for counting without examining the vote on those ballot papers. The Electoral Commission notes that candidate scrutineers are entitled to be present at the initial scrutiny. Before the next ordinary elections, the Electoral Commission will review its initial scrutiny processes and seek from stakeholders.

Postal votes from 34,059 electors were not accepted for further scrutiny (see the table below for the rejection reasons).

During the postal vote certificate extraction process some certificates are found to be empty or contain more than one person's ballot paper which requires both to be excluded. This means that the number of postal votes included in the count can be less than the total accepted postal certificates during scrutiny.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections:

- 438,735 postal votes were issued, an increase of 51.5 per cent from the 2021 NSW Local Government elections, where 289,569 postal votes were issued. The unavailability of internet voting is likely a factor in this increase (iVote was available at the 2021 elections). At the last ordinary elections in 2021, the rate of postal voting was 5.1 per cent, which is 2.7 percent lower compared with the 2024 ordinary elections.
- the return rate at close of receipt of postal votes by the Electoral Commission was 86 per cent (80 per cent at the 2021 NSW Local Government elections).
- the scrutiny reject rate was 8.9 per cent (10.8 per cent for the 2021 NSW Local Government elections).

Braille postal vote packs

The NSW Electoral Commission provided electors who are blind or have low vision the option to vote using braille postal ballot papers. Seven electors utilised this service and were sent postal vote packs containing ballot papers, postal vote instructions and a postal vote certificate all in Braille. The NSW Electoral Commission thanks Vision Australia for the production of these ballot papers.

Postal vote applications via candidates and political parties

Candidates and political parties may distribute postal vote application forms, together with electoral material. While some election participants note on the forms that completed postal vote applications should be returned directly to the Electoral Commission, other participants include a pre-paid return envelope addressed to the participant. That is, the elector's postal vote application is first received by the participant before being passed to the Electoral Commission. More than 850 postal vote applications of this kind were received via candidates and political parties at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

The Electoral Commission observed practices at previous elections where postal vote application forms were modified to such an extent that the role of the sending election participant was obscured. In response, changes that were made to the postal vote application form approved for distribution by election participants for this purpose at the 2023 NSW State election were repeated for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, including:

- A uniform blank field was included in the design of the form for election participants wanting to include electoral
 material on the form itself, to increase transparency for voters about who was sending them the form. Some
 election participants instead chose to distribute the Electoral Commission's ordinary postal vote application form
 and enclosed separate items of electoral material.
- To improve privacy awareness of electors and election participants, a standard personal information collection notice was required for all applications. This collection notice included specific advice with respect to the distribution of postal vote applications by candidates and political parties, including noting that applications may be returned directly to the NSW Electoral Commission instead of an address provided by the election participant.

This approach was designed to reduce the risk of an elector believing a postal vote application distributed by a candidate or political party had been sent to them by the Electoral Commission and was being returned directly to the Commission. It also better supported the privacy of electors by clarifying how their personal information may be treated if they returned their application via a candidate or political party.

To support the integrity of postal voting, in line with the NSW Electoral Commission's regulatory priority number four, prior to the 2024 NSW Local Government elections all registered candidates and political parties were contacted about what information may mislead electors when candidates send postal votes applications to their constituents. It was noted throughout the election period that candidates and parties issuing candidate postal vote applications did use the approved form, which included information for electors about alternate return options (that is, not requiring them to share their personal details with the party/candidate).

The Electoral Commissioner has included recommendations earlier in this report for legislative reform in this area.

Ongoing challenges for postal voting in Australia

Postal voting continues to be an important voting channel for electors who are unable to attend a voting centre to cast their vote. This is particularly the case for local government elections, where electoral legislation does not allow for out-of-area (absent) voting – electors must vote in their local council area/ward or at a special multi-area/ward polling place.

The enfranchisement of thousands of voters in New South Wales relies on an effective and efficient letter delivery service. Electoral commissions around Australia continue to press this point.

As technology assisted voting was limited to telephone voting for electors who are blind or have low vision, postal voting was also the only option for electors who were overseas for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. Due to the reduction in postal services and increase in postage times internationally, it was unlikely electors would receive their postal votes by the election day if ordinary international postal services were used throughout the whole postal voting period. To mitigate this risk, after 27 August 2024 overseas postal vote packs were sent by international courier. The Electoral Commission issued 14,587 postal votes to overseas electors. Of this, 10,327 were sent prior to 27 August 2024 via Australia Post international services and 4,260 were sent via Fedex international courier.

There were no interstate or international drop-off locations. All postal votes needed to be returned to the NSW Electoral Commission directly by the elector.

Election day in-person voting

Electors could vote in person on election day Saturday, 14 September 2024 from 8am to 6pm. All venues had their location and accessibility rating published on the NSW Electoral Commission website. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections 2,387,875 electors voted on election day.

Declared institution voting

Some nursing homes, convalescent homes, hospitals and aged-care facilities were appointed by the NSW Electoral Commissioner as declared institutions. Election officials attended these institutions in the five days prior to election day to allow residents to vote in person on site (9–13 September 2024). Voting at declared institutions is restricted to the residents of that particular institution. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, 14,424 declared institution votes were cast across 585 venues.

Declaration votes over the voting period

Declaration votes were issued during pre-poll, declared institution voting and on election day. Declaration vote types for a local government election are 'enrolment' (an elector enrolling for the first time, updating their enrolment information, or whose name does not appear on the roll) and name already marked as voted (an elector who appears on the roll to have already voted at the election [NAMAV]). For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, 144,275 declaration votes were issued as per the table below.

Counting and results

After the close of voting on election day, ballot boxes are opened and the ballot papers sorted and counted. A series of counts (the initial count, check count and the distribution of preferences) are undertaken before the final results are declared

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, count results were updated progressively on the NSW Electoral Commissions website (the *Virtual Tally Room*) from 6pm on election day. Information about how votes are counted in a local government election is available on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

Work health and safety considerations for count staff

In accordance with the NSW Electoral Commission's work health and safety principles:

- election-night counts were completed or ceased by 10pm
- referendum/poll ballot papers were only tallied on election night, not counted to 'Yes' or 'No'
- no counting was conducted on the Sunday following election day or any Sunday during the count period.

Changes to legislation

- The Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024 includes provisions setting out the method for the initial counting of votes for ballot papers that use group voting squares has been amended so that it is consistent with the method used at the NSW 2023 State election. This amendment was made in response to a proposal for legislative change suggested by the NSW Electoral Commission.
- This legislation change enabled the implementation of a new initial count process for councillor ballot papers with group voting squares. Ballot papers with group voting squares were only sorted to the first preference in the group voting squares above the line and to the first preference of the ungrouped candidates. This new process was implemented as a measure to increase the number of election venues that completed their counts on election night by 10pm to comply with NSW Electoral Commission work health and safety requirements, as well as to simplify count processes.

Centralised operations

In addition to processing postal vote applications and nominations, count processes were conducted at the four centralised sites as follows.

Sydney Count Centre

The Sydney Count Centre conducted the entire Check count of councillor ballot papers for the Sydney Metropolitan area. This included a Check count of the ballot papers counted on election night, batching and data entry of all ballot papers.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections a total of 2,387,130 ballot papers were processed at this count centre.

Newcastle Count Centre

The Newcastle Count Centre conducted the Initial count on election night of councillor ballot papers to support the Lake Macquarie councillor contest, and conducted the Initial counts for Central Coast councillor contests and the complete Check count process of councillor ballot papers for the selected regional contests. This included a Check count of the ballot papers counted on election night, batching and data entry of all ballot papers.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections a total of 635,924 ballot papers were processed at this count centre

Centralised Postal Vote Count Centre

The Centralised Postal Vote Count Centre was established prior to election day to manage the complete postal vote process including the processing of postal vote applications, the fulfilment process, helpdesk function, scrutiny and extraction. The nominations processes were also carried out at this centre; as was the:

• conduct of the Initial count on election night of postal votes for mayor contents and the Initial counts for all mayor, councillor and referendum ballot papers received via postal votes

• conduct of the complete Check count process for mayor and councillor ballot papers received via postal votes. This included an Initial count, Check count, batching and data entry of each ballot paper.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections a total of 470,203 ballot papers were processed at this count centre.

Centralised Declaration Vote Count Centre

Staff located at the Centralised Declaration Vote Count Centre conducted:

- the Initial count on election night of councillor ballot papers to support The Hills and Sydney councillor contests
- the complete Check count process for mayor and councillor ballot papers received via declaration votes from Metropolitan Sydney and selected regional polling places and pre-poll voting centres. This included the Initial count, Check count, batching and data entry of all ballot papers.

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections a total of 157,826 ballot papers were processed at this count centre.

Sunday following election day

No counting was conducted on the Sunday (15 September 2024) following election day, however logistical operations to transport ballots to centralised count centres did occur.

Counting from Monday following election day

Counting continued from Monday, 16 September 2024 and during the following weeks until all counts were completed. The returning officer's office operating hours were Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm. The centralised count centres (CDVCC, CPVCC, NCC, SCC) operated from Monday to Saturday 8.30am to 5.30pm.

Distribution of preferences

The distribution of preferences to determine the elected candidates could only be conducted after the close of receipt of postal votes at 6pm, Friday, 27 September 2024 and after all check counts were complete. The mayor and councillor distribution of preferences were conducted in each returning officer's office the week commencing Monday, 30 September 2024.

Declaration of results

Once all the votes were counted, the returning officer declared the election in writing, which is the official announcement of the election result. The date of the declaration varied from council to council and depended on the time it took to count the votes. The declaration was displayed at the office of the relevant council and the result published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

Scrutineers

Candidates could appoint scrutineers to observe voting, scrutiny and the counting of votes to verify that the election processes were carried out fairly and impartially. Appointed scrutineers were provided with the NSW Electoral Commission's scrutineer policy and guidelines to help ensure they understood their role.

Perceived ballot paper informality rates noted during count process

During the counting period for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the NSW Electoral Commission received a number of media enquiries about the high number of perceived informal votes.

During the Initial count process several types of votes are allocated to the "Informal/Other" category in the NSW Electoral Commission's Virtual tally room. At this early stage of the count process, the "Informal/Other" category does not just include informal votes. It also includes other types of votes that undergo further sorting and counting.

For example, some candidates' formal, Below the line votes are included in the "Informal/Other" category votes figure category during the initial count process. These candidates are marked with an asterisk (*) on the progressive results feed on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

During the Check count, these votes are data entered and, if formal, moved from the "Informal/Other" group and included in the formal count numbers. The "Informal/Other" category also includes ballot papers that are unclear ballot papers, and formal ballot papers that are marked both Above and Below the line. During the check count process some of these ballot papers will also move to the formal count numbers.

In the Check count, all ballot papers are entered into the NSW Electoral Commission's computer count system where each ballot paper is re-checked for formality and sorted to the correct category. During the Check count, the "Informal/Other" votes number reduces as the votes initially allocated to this category undergo scrutiny by election officials and are allocated to the formal count where applicable.

More information about counting ballot papers along with a counting votes explainer is available on the NSW Electoral Commission's website.

Moree Plains Shire Council councillor election

Toomelah Public School polling place informality

Following the declaration of results for the Moree Plains Shire Council, a review was conducted by the NSW Electoral Commission into the informal voting rate at the Toomelah Public School polling place, where 40 of 43 votes cast on election day Saturday, 14 September 2024 were informal.

The matter gained media attention, where it was asserted that NSW Electoral Commission staff gave incorrect or inadequate direction to electors. Subsequent inquiries by the Electoral Commission have confirmed that all staff were instructed to tell electors to follow the instructions on the ballot paper, and polling place staff confirmed that they did so. This is the process to be followed at all polling places to ensure that election officials do not influence the votes of electors.

On review by the NSW Electoral Commission of the results from the votes taken at Toomelah Public School it appears that the high proportion of informal votes relates to electors not placing the minimum number of preferences on the ballot paper. For the Moree Plains Shire Council councillor ballot paper, electors were required to mark a minimum of five (5) preferences for their vote to be formal.

The instructions printed on the Moree Plains Shire Council councillor ballot paper instructed voters to mark a 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 next to the five candidates in order of their preference for them and then further preferences if they wished. The instructions that must be printed in ballot papers are outlined in Schedule 11, Form 5 of the Local Government Regulation.

All 40 informal votes cast at the Toomelah Public School polling place were due to those electors not marking the minimum five preferences on the ballot paper: 39 of the 40 informal ballot papers were marked with a single '1', cross, or tick.

The informality rate for votes cast at the Toomelah Public School polling place was 93.0 per cent. The overall informality rate for the Moree Plains Shire councillor election was 8.68 per cent. No comparisons of informality are available for votes cast at the Toomelah Public School for the 2021 NSW Local Government elections as the polling place had to be decommissioned due to flooding. A the 2023 NSW State general election, 26 votes were taken and none of these were informal. It is noted that elections for the Legislative Assembly use optional preferential voting.

See Figure 1 below for a (black and white) reproduction of the Moree Plains Shire council ballot paper. See also Councillor ballot paper informality rates based on type (format) of ballot papers below for an analysis of informality according to ballot paper format. The Moree Plains Shire councillor ballot paper was type 'B', that is, there were no groups with a group voting square, but there was a group and there were ungrouped candidates.

On Friday, 6 December 2024, representatives from the NSW Electoral Commission met with the General Manager and three current councillors of Moree Plains Shire Council to discuss the informality rate at Toomelah polling place. Electoral Commission representatives noted that they would continue to work with the council to identify ways to further support remote and indigenous communities to participate at future elections. Options discussed included focused training for staff in identified polling places as well as a 'train the trainer' program with an appointed community spokesperson, similar to the Vote Talk program the Electoral Commission supports for state and local government elections for culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

The Electoral Commission is also considering modifying its electoral material registration checklist, for the use of its temporary election staff, to provide more guidance about how the minimum number of preferences required for a formal vote may be indicated.

No candidate contesting the Moree Plains Shire Council councillor election requested a recount.

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¹ The NSW Electoral Commission maintains a polling place at Toomelah Public School for state and local government elections. However, there was no polling place at Toomelah Public School (or Boggabilla Public School) at the 2021 Local Government elections due to the flood emergency declared two days before election day. Both townships were evacuated to Moree. As such the polling places were abolished prior to election day.

Figure 2: Ballot paper type A





Figure 3: Ballot paper type B




Figure 5: Ballot paper type D




Figure 6: Ballot paper type E





Figure 7: Ballot paper type F



Recount requests for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections

After the result of the count for an election has been ascertained and at any time before the declaration of that result:

- a candidate may request a recount of the ballot papers, and
- the Electoral Commissioner may direct the returning officer to conduct a recount.

Any request for a recount must:

- be in writing, and
- · be signed by the candidate, and
- · set out the reasons for the request, and
- be lodged with the returning officer within 24 hours of the results being published on NSW Electoral Commission results website.

A candidate's reasons for requesting a recount must identify a specific error or irregularity that could potentially affect the election result, that is, an error or irregularity in the scrutiny or counting of ballot papers. The Electoral Commissioner considers all requests received and determines whether a recount is to be conducted.

A candidate who is granted a recount is not required to cover the cost of the recount. Where a recount is requested and subsequently approved by the Electoral Commissioner, the declaration of results will be delayed until the completion of the recount.

Twenty-six (26) recount requests were received for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. Thirty (30) requests were received for the 2021 NSW Local Government elections. See Table 22 for details.

The most common reason stated in the requests was the closeness of the result. A close result is not, of itself, a reason for which a recount will usually be conducted. Evidence of some error or irregularity in the counting process affecting the accuracy of the count is also required.

Other reasons commonly raised in the recount requests related to misunderstandings about the differences between the initial count and check count results, and misunderstandings about the formality of ballot papers.

The Electoral Commissioner directed that recounts would be conducted in respect of requests received for the Edward River Council and Hay Shire Council councillor elections. The recount requests stated a very small vote margin between the elected candidate and the last remaining candidate.

As noted above, the NSW Electoral Commission's policy is that a small margin of votes is highly unlikely, of itself, to be considered a sufficient reason for conducting a recount. There were, however, other circumstances relevant to the Edward River Council and Hay Shire Council elections – for example, the coincidence of these counts being in the same regional returning office and the unavailability of the returning officer during part of the count – that were the factors considered by the Electoral Commissioner in determining that a recount of votes would be undertaken in these two particular cases. See below for details of these recounts.

While a recount was not conducted for the Parkes Shire Council councillor election, before the declaration of the result of that election the returning officer was directed by the Electoral Commissioner to complete what is referred to as check count review for two polling places (see below), a process which confirms the accuracy of the data entry check count process.

Edward River Council recount

At the final count of the distribution of preferences for the Edward River Council councillor election, the difference between the last candidate elected and the candidate with the next largest number of votes who was not elected was four (4) votes.

During the recount it was determined that all of the preferences on two ballot papers had not been entered into the computer count system. Those preferences were entered and the distribution of preferences was conducted again. The result of the count was unchanged after the recount; however, the difference between the two candidates was reduced to two (2) votes.

Hay Shire Council recount

At the final count during the distribution of preferences for the Hay Shire Council councillor election, the difference between the last candidate elected and the candidate with the next largest number of votes who was not elected was three (3) votes.

The recount determined that the preferences on all of the ballot papers had been entered into the computer count system correctly and the result was unchanged.

Parkes Shire Council check count review

Incorrect information was provided to candidates for the Parkes Shire Council councillor election about the date of the initial count of the Parkes Shire Council pre-poll ballot papers. That initial count was subsequently repeated to ensure all candidates had the opportunity to appoint scrutineers to observe the count.

Furthermore, the initial count of the Alectown Hall polling place votes was affected by an error where all of the first preference votes for two candidates had been incorrectly counted with the informal ballot papers. To provide further assurance that the result for the election was not affected by these issues, before the distribution of preferences was completed to determine the result of the election, the returning officer was directed to complete a data entry review of the Parkes Shire Council pre-poll votes and the Alectown Hall polling place check counts.

A data entry review is very similar to the process for a recount. The procedure consists of two election officials, cross checking the preferences on the "Ballot Paper Markings Report" which is system-generated from the data entry process, against each physical ballot paper in the batch.

Any discrepancy found is assessed by the returning officer and corrected in the computer count system. The 'Ballot paper markings report' for any batch that required correction is printed again and the process outlined above is repeated.

A senior election official from the NSW Electoral Commission head office was present at the Parkes Shire Council returning officer's office to assist the review process.

The review confirmed that markings on two ballot papers cast in the Parkes Shire Council pre-poll were considered by the officials and scrutineers to require correction, although neither affected first preference votes. No ballot papers required correction in Alectown polling place count. Accordingly, recount requests for the Parkes Shire Council election after the result of the count had been ascertained were not accepted.

Staffing the elections

Staff numbers and roles

The NSW Electoral Commission directly employed 22,990 temporary staff for the elections, in various roles and for varying timeframes.

Recruiting senior election officials

Senior election officials fill the positions of returning officer and returning officer support officer. Returning officers are the front line for the NSW Electoral Commission's engagement with a diverse range of stakeholders, including election staff, candidates, political parties, electors and the general public.

A structured and competitive recruitment process for elections has built a highly capable and effective talent pool of senior election officials, with role descriptions aligned to the NSW Government's capability framework. This talent pool is called upon to resource state and local government elections and by-elections.

Recruiting election officials

Election officials were placed in returning officers' offices, pre-poll venues and worked at polling places on election day. A staffing model based on vote projections helped determine the number and type of staff appointed to each voting location. Vote projections are calculated using historical trends and population growth and movement. Other factors considered include community demographics (for example, culturally and linguistically diverse populations) and local events scheduled on election day (for example, festivals and concerts).

To meet our work health and safety requirement that staff should not work in isolation, a deputy polling place manager was employed at every polling place. This person assisted with the set-up of the polling place on the Friday evening before election day and ensured appropriate breaks and support for the polling place manager on election day.

Applications for election work were captured via an online expression of interest. The NSW Electoral Commission's election staffing recruitment system requires replacement and provides limited data governance, employee performance management and reporting. Funding is yet to be provided to the Electoral Commission for a new system in time for the 2028 Local Government ordinary elections, noting the Electoral Commission's digital modernisation program was not funded in 2024-25.

Recruitment was supported by social media across the NSW Electoral Commission platforms, media outreach and an advertising campaign (print, radio, social and search engine marketing).

Extensive outreach was conducted via local councils, community groups, schools, TAFE, private colleges, universities, employment agencies, the NSW Aboriginal Land Council and many volunteer organisations across New South Wales to promote the opportunity to work at the elections. The NSW Electoral Commission collaborated with the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) to contact their database of election workers.

Contingent staff for the centralised operations

Three external recruitment agencies were engaged to provide staff to work at the NSW Electoral Commission's four centralised operations sites: Sydney Count Centre, Newcastle Count Centre, Centralised Postal Vote Count Centre and the Centralised Declaration Vote Count Centre. This is in addition to the temporary staffing roles indicated in the table above.

Approximately 1,970 contracted (contingent) staff were engaged across all centralised operations, some of which operated for a period of seven months. At the peak of counting operations there were 1,454 staff across all sites on 18 and 19 September 2024.

Secondments from other Australian jurisdictions

The NSW Electoral Commission wishes to thank the 12 staff secondees (11 from the Australian Electoral Commission and one from the Tasmanian Electoral Commission) who supported the delivery of the 2024 NSW Local Government elections in centralised operations.

Returning officer support officer support centre

A support centre was established for the returning officers, employing 12 returning officer support officers (ROSOs) assisted by five administration personnel and the support centre team leader. Each ROSO was allocated up to six returning officers. The ROSO support centre operated for 14 weeks. The support centre received 6,182 calls, initiated 7,357 outbound calls, managed more than 34,450 emails and conducted over 200 webinars/conference calls to support the returning officers during the election period.

Impartiality, eligibility and political neutrality

The Electoral Commission is committed to maintaining public confidence in the integrity of the electoral system and the impartiality of election officials. All applicants must be on the electoral roll to apply for work at an election.

All applicants must declare they have no affiliation with any political party, lobbyists or campaigners and have no criminal record. They cannot engage in any activity that could reflect adversely, or be seen as reflecting adversely, on the political neutrality of the NSW Electoral Commission.

Employment helpdesk

An employment help desk operated from 29 April to 1 November 2024. The help desk was resourced during peak times by 12 staff and received 16,966 calls and made 3,832 outbound calls. The most calls received in a single day during these elections (603) were received on the Monday prior to election day.

Staff training

Online training was compulsory for all staff working at the elections. The training covered the processes and procedures relevant to the election role being performed, and included information about cyber security, ballot paper security and workplace health and safety (wellbeing and fatigue management). Various roles were required to participate in face-to-face training.

Workforce diversity and inclusion

The NSW Electoral Commission embraces diversity and inclusion and is committed to creating a workplace that reflects the population of New South Wales.

Of the temporary election staff employed to work at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, 22.2 per cent stated that they had no previous election experience, compared with 50 per cent who were new to election work for the 2021 Local Government elections. See Appendix C for a list of the main community languages spoken by election officials working in polling places on election day. Staff who spoke a language in addition to English were identified by a badge showing the language(s) spoken.

Work health and safety

Work health, safety and wellbeing

The NSW Electoral Commission is committed to providing a safe and healthy work environment. The 2024 NSW Local Government elections were a large community event, involving millions of electors, tens of thousands of staff and thousands of venues. This presents significant challenges in maintaining safety standards. The NSW Electoral Commission approaches each election event as an opportunity to embed a positive safety culture and ensure a safe environment for all involved.

Work health and safety principles

The Electoral Commission's *Work health and safety principles* are a set of non-negotiable 'golden rules' that are designed to minimise the risks of fatigue and working in isolation. A review of the safety performance during the 2023 NSW State election identified staff driving while fatigued on election day as one of the critical safety risks. This prompted a review of, and improvements to, the principles. The key changes to the *Work health and safety principles* introduced for the 2024 Local Government elections were to:

- stop counting ballot papers 30-minutes earlier, at 10pm instead of 10:30pm.
- increase the minimum break between shifts from 8-hours to 10-hours.
- identify and separate the principles that relate to election day and those that relate to everyone, every day.

The NSW Electoral Commission is committed to embedding work health and safety principles into everyday ways of working. The importance of adhering to the work health and safety principles was reinforced during staff inductions, training and debriefs, with posters displayed in all election venues.

Safety and wellbeing training

The Electoral Commission continues to implement its *Safety Culture and Leadership Program* in partnership with an external specialist safety provider. Approximately 100 staff members attended psychology-based safety training leading up to the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. A group of senior executives and managers attended a series of application workshops between the 2023 and 2024 election calendar focussed on elevating safety leadership.

The NSW Electoral Commission invested in additional training for staff to build event safety capability with:

- 14 staff members completed First Aid training and were appointed as First Aid Officers to proactively manage injuries in the four centralised operations centres at Homebush and Newcastle
- 17 staff members attended Fire Warden training to provide expertise should an emergency situation arise
- refresher training was provided to the First Aid Officers and Fire Wardens at our centralised count centres
- site inductions and orientations were conducted for staff and visitors.

Implementing incident reporting and risk management improvements

The NSW Electoral Commission reviews its safety performance following each election. Improvements were identified and implemented for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. These included:

- the introduction of a safer box cutter device, with a concealed blade to reduce the risk of lacerations
- the introduction of a table-top voting screen option for electors with mobility impairment, and additional signage on standard voting screens to reduce the risk of falls
- enhanced system for capturing incidents this saw an increase in incident reporting from the 2023 NSW State election of 147 per cent
- increased the number of staff with safety training at the centralised count centres to provide onsite support during bump in/bump out phases, where high-risk works/activities occur
- improved sharing of safety information:
- a safety alert was released to communicate learnings following incidents
- safe work practice posters provided practical guidance for common work activities
- safety noticeboards were displayed at the centralised operations sites.

Incidents and injuries

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, operational risks were identified and incidents were reported and monitored on a daily basis from 15 July to 11 October 2024.

SafeWork NSW reporting

Slips, trips and falls continue to be the main incidents reported, however, it would appear that the additional control measures implemented for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections (for example, locating and testing external lighting, site safety inductions, safe work practices focussing on stair safety) have made a positive impact on workplace safety as the number of slips, trips and falls has declined.

SafeWork NSW was notified of six serious injuries as follows:

- 3 slips, trips and falls
- 1 incident involving a vehicle
- 1 incident as a result of a personal medical condition
- 1 incident involving equipment/tools/appliances.

The NSW Electoral Commission investigates each reported incident to identify the root cause(s), and to implement appropriate corrective actions to eliminate or minimise the risk of these incidents reoccurring in operational processes. All SafeWork NSW notifiable incidents have been resolved and closed.

Workers' compensation claims

Ten workers' compensation claims were lodged due to injuries sustained during the election event period from 15 July to 11 October 2024.

Supporting in-person voting to be safe and free of interference

Several initiatives assisted the implementation of the NSW Electoral Commission's regulatory priority number five, which is to support in-person voting at elections in New South Wales to be safe and free of interference, including for election officials working at polling places.

As mentioned previously in this report, multi-agency collaboration helped to raise awareness of the elections and leverage external support in the event of localised emergencies and external threats.

Of significance for the safe conduct of elections, as previously mentioned, the *Local Government (General) Amendment (Elections) Regulation 2024* makes it an offence to film or photograph election officials and scrutineers while performing their duties, in a way that would likely make the official or scrutineer feel intimidated or harassed; and election managers and polling place managers have the ability to give health and safety directions at any place where voting is occurring.

Training for returning officers at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections included the safety of election officials as well as escalation and de-escalation procedures.

Venues

Procurement, inspection and selection

The hiring of appropriate venues for voting at a statewide election is always a challenging exercise.

The process of venue selection for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections commenced 12 months prior to the elections. This allowed time for engagement with individual councils because involving councils early in the procurement process enabled a number of councils to provide council-owned venues in appropriate locations for the period required. This helped to reduce the cost of conducting the elections for those councils. Where councils were unable to provide suitable venues, the NSW Electoral Commission sourced commercial properties.

To assist voters and simplify administration, the NSW Electoral Commission endeavoured to appoint premises that had been used at previous elections. Most venues are required for only one day (election day polling places), others for a period of up to two weeks (pre-poll voting offices), returning officers' offices for three months, with extended leases on the centralised operations and count centres. The Electoral Commission selected the most suitable premises from those available. Venue considerations were extensive and included size, location, accessibility, amenities, street frontage, access for deliveries, internet connectivity and workplace health and safety. The ability to secure premises that met functional requirements presented challenges, particularly in negotiating agreements to enter short-term leases when the supply of premises is limited.

The NSW Electoral Commission provided contact information for all venue managers to NSW Police as well as the addresses of returning officer offices, pre-poll and election day voting venues in the event of an emergency.

Venue accessibility

The NSW Electoral Commission published on its website the accessibility level of every pre-poll venue and election day polling place: that is, fully accessible, assisted access (partially accessible) and non-accessible (no wheelchair access). If partially accessible, a description of the accessibility was also displayed on the website.

All voting venues were equipped with a wheelchair accessible voting privacy screen, maxi pens, magnifiers and a 'table top' voting screen for electors who required a seat while casting a vote. The table-top privacy screen was a new accessibility feature introduced at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. Posters displayed in voting centres listed the support available to electors.

- The percentage of fully accessible polling places for the 2024 elections (at 28 per cent of polling places) is an increase on the 2021 Local Government elections (at 26 per cent).
- The percentage of fully accessible pre-poll venues for the 2024 elections (58 per cent of pre-poll venues) is an increase compared with the 2021 Local Government elections (at 47 per cent)
- The percentage of fully accessible returning officers' offices for the 2024 Local Government elections (59 per cent of total returning officers' offices) is an increase on the 2021 elections (at 44 per cent).

Use of school premises on election day

Approximately 60 per cent of election day polling places were schools. Schools are generally well located, have the space and most of the amenities required and are available on Saturdays. One drawback of such a high reliance on schools is that the NSW Electoral Commission is often not provided with access on election day to the school's carpark and the accessible toilet. Not having access to these facilities usually means that a school polling place cannot be identified as fully accessible.

The NSW Electoral Commission has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Education for the use of public school premises on election day. Public school premises are not free and must be paid for by the NSW Electoral Commission according to fees set by the NSW Department of Education.

Returning officers' offices

To create cost efficiencies at these elections, the NSW Electoral Commission established 'regional' returning offices where possible and practicable. For each of the regional returning officers' offices, a single returning officer managed the elections for a number of councils.

Table 30 lists the returning office locations for the 2024 Local Government elections and the number of councils serviced by each office (excludes councils with uncontested elections). Some offices serviced a single council, others serviced multiple councils.

Decommissioning the venues

Decommissioning election venues is also a significant exercise that can take up to two weeks to complete for returning officers' offices and the centralised counting centres, with pre-poll voting venues generally completed on the Friday night before election day and polling places on election night.

A number of coordinated activities are required to be completed across the various venue types. Key activities include:

- the reconciliation, packing and return of all secure election materials for example, ballot papers, authorised rolls, tablet devices and other IT computer equipment
- the collection, consolidation and return of various non-secure election materials for example standing operational procedures folders, forms and manuals, stationery and operational documents specific to each venue
- the return of all hired furniture and other venue-specific items including white goods, accessibility ramps, heaters/air-conditioning units
- collection and disposal of election cardboard materials from voting venues where premises do not have recycling/waste removal or are unable to accommodate due to vast volume of waste created
- completion of property condition reports and makegood of those premises specific to returning officer's offices and centralised counting centres
- change of locks back to original barrels, and handing over keys provided for election day venues.

Following an election there is a high volume of enquiries (including complaints) from landlords and the public relating to general venue suitability and the reporting of damage. Rubbish, election cardboard materials, wastepaper and candidate signage must all be removed and the venues restored to their pre-election state/condition.

Ballot papers and supplies

Ballot paper printing and distribution

For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections a total of 9.61 million ballot papers (ordinary and postal ballot papers) were printed and packed into 9,162 cartons for secure delivery. The movement of cartons was electronically tracked throughout the election process to ensure the security and integrity of ballot papers.

Ballot paper monitoring

BallotTrack is used to ensure the transparency and security of ballot papers throughout the election process. BallotTrack is a centralised 'track and trace' online application that uses scanning devices to monitor and record the movement of various containers containing ballot papers throughout the entire life cycle of ballot papers.

Equipment and materials supplied

A sample of the items procured and transported to election venues across New South Wales for the 2024 Local Government elections includes:

- 5,055 individual pieces of furniture for the returning offices
- 5,717 individual pieces of furniture for the centralised operations sites in Sydney and Newcastle
- 45,000 voting privacy screens
- 52,000 Band-Aids.

The above items and volumes do not convey the scale of a statewide election or the logistics required to set up and decommission all of the election venues.

Waste management

When providing electoral services, wherever possible the Electoral Commission seeks to use paper and cardboard items comprising recycled content and to plan that the paper and cardboard items are themselves recycled after use. Ballot papers and other sensitive electoral materials are securely stored according to legislation. At the conclusion of the legislated preservation period (eighteen months after election day for those councils choosing the process of countback elections to fill a casual vacancy and six months for those not) these items are securely shredded for recycling.

Compliance and enforcement

The three-member NSW Electoral Commission is responsible for ensuring compliance with and enforcement of the election provisions of the *Local Government Act 1993* (LG Act); the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021* (LG Regulation) and the *Electoral Funding Act 2018* (EF Act).

While the Electoral Commission undertakes compliance and enforcement activities arising from, or connected to, elections throughout the year, at local government ordinary elections it also establishes a targeted compliance field operation. A field operation is highly visible to election participants and voters and is designed to support public trust in the strong and fair regulation of NSW elections by:

- proactively engaging with election stakeholders in their local areas
- · ensuring compliance by participants and their supporters with legislation at a particular event
- promoting understanding of the Electoral Commission's enforcement responsibilities
- supporting the Electoral Commission to be an effective, active and responsible regulator.

During the election, 10 field teams (each comprised of two investigators) visited various pre-poll and election day polling places throughout New South Wales. Four teams were sent to regional areas which covered several North Coast, Central West, South Coast and Hunter local government areas. The remaining six teams covered the Sydney metropolitan area.

Throughout the pre-poll period and on election day, the teams attended 75 of the 122 local government areas holding contested elections, representing 61 per cent of all local government areas. This was an increase from the 2021 Local Government elections, where 47 local government areas were visited. This was achieved by doubling the number of field teams.

Some pre-poll venues were attended on multiple occasions because of recurring general complaints about the conduct of campaigners.

Allegations relating to the 2024 NSW Local Government elections

Compliance matters are created on receipt of an allegation from an external source or on the NSW Electoral Commission's own instigation. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the NSW Electoral Commission created 205 compliance matters. Most of the allegations were reported during the regulated period for the election, from 5 August to 14 September 2024. The NSW Electoral Commission continued to receive election-related allegations, however, some months after the election. Six of the matters created ultimately related to conduct that is not regulated by the NSW Electoral Commission.

Overall, there were 37 per cent fewer compliance matters created for the 2024 Local Government elections than for the 2021 Local Government elections (324 matters created). A reduction was reflected within each of the broad categories of allegations.

Allegations received in relation to Local Government Regulation

Of the 205 matters created by the NSW Electoral Commission, 169 related to potential breaches of the Local Government Regulation.

The following table lists the number of matters created (and their status as at 7 February 2025) regarding potential breaches relating to the Local Government Regulation.

Allegations received in relation to the Electoral Funding Act

In total, the NSW Electoral Commission created 30 matters regarding potential breaches of the *Electoral Funding Act* 2018. It is likely this number will increase following the compliance audits of donation and expenditure disclosures for the political participants of this election, noting the disclosure of electoral expenditure is not due until September 2025.

The following table lists the number of matters created and their status (as at 7 February 2025) regarding potential breaches relating to the Electoral Funding Act.

Engagement with social media platforms

In anticipation of increased campaigning through social media and in accordance with the Electoral Council of Australia and New Zealand's Statement of Intent, the NSW Electoral Commission engaged with social media platforms to confirm reporting pathways should non-compliant electoral material be identified. NSW Electoral Commission representatives engaged with Meta (Facebook, Instagram), Google (YouTube), Snapchat, TikTok and Microsoft (LinkedIn). Representatives from X (formerly Twitter) did not respond.

Separately, representatives of the NSW Electoral Commission engaged with the Commonwealth eSafety Commission as part of the implementation of a previously negotiated referral protocol, should social media platform(s) not comply with a request to take down material.

Social media was monitored throughout the regulated period by both the Investigation team and the Communications team. These escalation pathways did not need to be used in relation to unlawful electoral material. In most cases involving non-compliance, the person responsible was contacted and voluntarily remediated the breach. No other significant issue was identified.

Emerging compliance issues

The possible enforcement options available for offences under the LG Regulation are limited to issuing a warning or commencing prosecution in court. A decision to prosecute normally results in the commencement of criminal proceedings against a person. Before the NSW Electoral Commission exercises its discretionary power to decide to prosecute, it considers, in accordance with its Prosecution Policy, factors including the following:

- the potential serious consequence of prosecution action, including a criminal conviction and liability to a penalty
- the seriousness or conversely, the triviality of the alleged offence
- the prevalence of the alleged offence in the community, whether it is of considerable public concern and the need to denounce and deter the offending behaviour
- whether the prosecution would be perceived as counter-productive
- the likely length and expense of a trial if disproportionate to the seriousness of the alleged offence.

By comparison, the *Electoral Regulation 2018* provides that certain comparable offences under the *Electoral Act 2017* relating to electoral material can be enforced through the issue of a penalty notice. This alternative to prosecution is an effective enforcement option that can provide general and specific deterrence.

Non-voter process

Under electoral legislation, after each election the NSW Electoral Commissioner is required to issue penalty notices to those electors whose names were not marked off the electoral roll as having voted or recorded as providing a sufficient reason for not voting. The penalty for not voting in a local government election is \$55.00. The initial penalty notice, referred to as an Apparent Failure to Vote notice, gives recipients the following options:

- if they voted, provide details of where
- if they did not vote, provide a sufficient reason
- if they did not vote, pay the penalty
- dispute the matter and have it heard in court.

Responses are provided either in writing or through a self-service online portal.

If a person does not respond to the initial notice by the due date (28 days from the issue date of the notice), a reminder notice is issued giving a further 28 days to deal with the matter, followed by a final notice. If no response is received by the due date shown on the final notice, the matter is referred to Revenue NSW for enforcement action. The revenue collected from non-voting penalties is not received by the NSW Electoral Commission.

After the 2024 Local Government elections and following the initial exclusion of all electors who were able to be identified by the NSW Electoral Commission as having a valid reason for not voting, 724,968 initial *Apparent failure to vote* notices were issued on 20 November 2024. As in past elections, it is likely that a significant proportion of these apparent non-voters will have valid reasons for not voting and will be excused.

As mentioned previously, all enrolled electors of Newcastle Ward 3 were excluded from the failure-to-vote process (see City of Newcastle Ward 3 data breach for more information).

Electors are encouraged to sign up to the NSW Electoral Commission's free election reminder service (elections.nsw.gov.au/remindme). The election reminder service enables electors to receive email and/or text message (SMS) reminders of an upcoming local government or state election event relevant to their enrolled address.

Multi-voter analysis

An analysis of the elector 'mark-offs' is conducted after every election. This is to ensure that any electors who appear to have voted more than once are identified and recorded. If the NSW Electoral Commissioner has reasonable grounds to suspect that an elector has voted multiple times at a state election, the elector may be declared a 'special elector' under the Electoral Act. While no similar power exists in relation to multi-voters at local government elections under the *Local Government Act 1993*, apparent multi-voters are recorded and may be contacted by the NSW Electoral Commission to ask them to provide an explanation and to educate them about the offence of voting more than once. The results of the elector 'mark-offs' analysis will be published at a later date. Further enforcement action may also be undertaken for the offence of voting more than once where appropriate.

Education, information and engagement

The NSW Electoral Commission has the legislative function of promoting public awareness of electoral matters that are in the public interest by means of education, information programs and research.

Integrated communications strategy

The NSW Electoral Commission again implemented an integrated communications program, including advertising, media, direct communications and targeted stakeholder engagement to raise public awareness about the 2024 NSW Local Government elections and provide information and education to voters and political participants. The aim was to maintain a transparent and trustworthy electoral process and support people across NSW to participate in the elections and comply with their obligations. The NSW Electoral Commission's approach is to continuously improve information, education and awareness by building on the work implemented at each election.

Key audiences

The primary audiences for the education and information program were all residents of New South Wales above the age of 18 and all political participants, including candidates, political parties and third-party campaigners. Voter audience segments were further broken down to target people with barriers to participation in democracy, including First Nations people, people with disability, culturally and linguistically diverse populations and young people, as well as eligible voters living in local government areas with a history of low voter turnout.

Communications channels

All communications and advertising activities directed people to the Electoral Commission's website where more detailed information was available about the administration and regulation of the elections. A range of communication channels were used to reach and engage these key audiences.

A statewide, voter awareness campaign was rolled out from mid-July 2024. In addition, a series of other advertising campaigns were implemented during the 2024 NSW Local Government elections period and integrated into the broader communications approach:

- · stop and consider disinformation campaign
- election workforce recruitment campaign
- political donations education campaign.

See Appendix D for examples of campaign advertising.

Voter awareness campaign

Campaign approach

The 2024 NSW Local Government elections voter awareness campaign used a clear, informative, brand-focused approach to alert electors in New South Wales, interstate and overseas to their obligation to participate in the elections and their voting options. The campaign ran from mid-July 2024 to 14 September 2024.

The Electoral Commission delivered a campaign that combined a broad-based approach with targeted messaging and channels. This allowed the campaign to reach as many voters as possible, while also focusing on key audiences to improve voter turnout and reduce barriers to voting. These audiences included:

- First Nations peoples
- people with disability
- youth
- culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities
- · voters in low voter turnout districts
- overseas and interstate voters.

Traditional TV, radio, outdoor and print advertising were combined with a range of digital channels to drive audiences to the NSW Electoral Commission website and deliver tailored messaging to key audiences.

Messaging

Messaging was developed to drive awareness of the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, ensuring NSW electors were aware of when, where, and how to vote. The campaign built on the success of the "Get ready, Get set, Go!" concept used at the 2023 NSW State General election. The "Get ready, Get set, Go!" campaign messaging was delivered over three phases:

- Phase 1: Get ready Check your enrolment and save the date.
- Phase 2: Get set Know your voting options and plan your vote.
- Phase 3: Go! Early voting is open and go and vote.

Campaign evaluation

Post-campaign research surveyed a representative group of 1,209 NSW eligible voters about the campaign.

- 47 per cent of survey participants recalled seeing the ads, nearly half of whom strongly agreed that the intended messages were communicated
- 60 per cent took action as a result of the campaign.

Stop and consider campaign

Campaign approach

The NSW Electoral Commission implemented the 'Stop and consider' campaign from mid-August to a week after election day in September to alert the public that not all the information available to them about the 2024 NSW Local Government elections would be true and could in fact be seeking to influence their vote.

'Stop and consider' was also conducted for the 2023 NSW State election, based on similar advertising by the Australian Electoral Commission for the 2019 and 2022 federal elections and the Victorian Electoral Commission for its 2022 state election.

The campaign ran from 14 August to 21 September 2024 (covering the close of nominations through to the first week of vote counting), across radio, digital, social and print media in NSW and included translated video, print and social advertising in seven languages: Cantonese, Vietnamese, Mandarin, Arabic, Greek, Italian and Korean. The campaign alerted people to the presence of disinformation on social media and news websites, where to seek accurate information, and encouraged them to report anything of concern to the NSW Electoral Commission.

The campaign was part of a multi-level approach to combatting electoral disinformation including the Disinformation Register and social media management approach for these elections. The campaign was funded by a special purpose grant from the Premier's Department.

Messaging

The campaign encouraged voters to consider what they saw, heard, and read that may have sought to influence their vote or understanding of the electoral process. It also suggested taking time to consider if the information available was:

- Reliable Was the information from a reliable source?
- Current When was the information published? Always check the original source and publication date.
- Safe Could it be a scam? If you are suspicious of the information being shared, think carefully before engaging.

Campaign evaluation

Post-campaign research surveyed a representative group of 1,012 NSW eligible voters about the campaign:

- 32 per cent of survey participants recalled seeing the ads, 44 per cent of whom strongly agreed that the intended messages were communicated
- 59 per cent took action as a result of the campaign.

Political donations education campaign

Campaign approach

The NSW Electoral Commission has run several tranches of its political donations public awareness campaign to educate people in New South Wales about political donations laws. Another tranche of the campaign was run during the 2024 NSW Local Government elections period, with additional messaging regarding recent legislation changes to prohibited donors. The campaign ran across print, digital and social media.

This education program was a specific deliverable of the NSW Electoral Commission's regulatory priorities (priority one), and utilised animations and translated information.

Messaging

The campaign let donors and potential donors know that important rules apply when making a political donation. It focused on the following key pieces of information and encouraged people to find out more on the NSW Electoral Commission website:

- important rules apply to political donations in NSW
- cash donations over \$100 must not be made or accepted
- certain industry groups are prohibited from making political donations in NSW
- there are limits to the amount any political participant can accept from a donor in a financial year.

Election workforce recruitment campaign

Campaign approach

More than 20,000 staff were recruited to deliver the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. The recruitment campaign aimed to encourage people who had never worked at an election before to apply, utilising a range of channels to reach different audiences who might be open to working at an election.

Messaging

The focus of the campaign was to encourage anyone eligible to express their interest in working at the election. Key messages were:

- Help deliver democracy. Work at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.
- If you are over 18 and enrolled to vote, apply today.
- Paid short and longer-term positions available across NSW. All training provided. No previous election experience is required.

Culturally and linguistically diverse approach to campaigns

Advertising campaigns run during the election period included tailored components directed at key language groups and Aboriginal people in New South Wales.

Advertising assets were translated, where needed, into seven languages, selected based the prevalence of the language spoken in NSW, cross referenced with how well English is spoken by those groups. Based on these criteria, Arabic, Cantonese, Mandarin, Greek, Vietnamese, Italian and Korean were selected.

Media plans were developed and implemented to reach each audience through the most appropriate media channels. The following table outlines the percentage of campaign spend, audience and channels for each campaign.

Media outreach

Proactive media outreach supported the election with a schedule of statewide and localised media releases promoting awareness of the election, how people could plan to vote on or before election day and key events in the election calendar, including the release of results.

During the period 5 August to 3 October, the NSW Electoral Commission received 5214 media mentions and provided spokespeople for more than 50 interviews.

Responding to media enquiries

In addition to proactive media outreach, the NSW Electoral Commission responded to various incoming media enquiries, with topics changing in line with phases of the elections.

Social media approach

The NSW Electoral Commission utilised official social media accounts on Facebook, X, Instagram and LinkedIn to support the delivery of the 2024 Local Government elections. The approach actively engaged the voting public while managing issues as they arose throughout the election period.

NSW Electoral Commission channels

A daily schedule of social media content was rolled out across the NSW Electoral Commission's social channels (Facebook, X, Instagram and LinkedIn), amplifying messaging from the voter awareness, Stop and consider, political donations and recruitment campaigns, as well as more specific information about voting options, key dates, voter support and information for candidates, political parties, third-party campaigners and donors.

327 organic (non-paid) pieces of content were posted across the channels during the election period 4 June to 14 September with a reach of almost two million users and more than 5,600 engagements.

Customer service and platform moderation

The NSW Electoral Commission channels were also used daily in the lead-up to election day to provide customer service support and respond to questions and issues as they arose.

- These channels received more than 8,700 inbound messages during the election period, 6.4 per cent (560) on X and 91.22 per cent (7,9800) on Facebook.
- More than 1,730 messages were responded to, beginning to spike in the week of the closure of nominations.
- 75 outbound messages relating to nomination were sent around 24 August.

Monitoring and community management

The NSW Electoral Commission undertook ongoing monitoring and moderation of social media during election period to manage the impacts of disinformation and misinformation.

Where the NSW Electoral Commission became aware of prominent pieces of misinformation or disinformation circulating on social media platforms or news sites, it was added to its *Disinformation register* and rebutted with the correct information in response to the posts. Seven items were included on the Register during the election period.

Election reminder service

Free election reminders via email and/or text message are available to electors enrolled in New South Wales who sign up to the election reminder service via the NSW Electoral Commission's website. The service enables subscribers to receive an email or SMS reminder (or both) of an upcoming election relevant to their enrolled address. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the following reminders were sent:

Early voting/pre-poll reminder message sent 3 September 2024

Election day reminder message sent 12 September 2024

SMS: 300,211Email: 308,987.

Election event website

A subsite of the NSW Electoral Commission's website was developed to provide a central location with critical information about the 2024 Local Government elections. All communications and advertising activities directed people to the subsite where detailed information was available about the administration and regulation of the election. The subsite content included:

- general information about the elections
- · key dates for the elections
- checking enrolment
- candidate information
- early voting options
- voting on election day
- polling place locations
- · counting schedules and locations
- work opportunities
- · election material registration and display
- pre-election metrics
- results.

This subsite was supported by the For voters, For political participants and Funding and disclosure information on the website and the election-specific community education resources.

For the 2024 Local Government election, the *Assistance for voters* content (which links to in-language information and information for people living with disability saw increased page views of more than 38 per cent compared with the 2021 NSW Local Government elections, with the average time on page increasing. Opportunities were identified to convey information in alternative formats, particularly videos and animations.

Engagement with target audiences

Identify, mitigate and eliminate barriers to participation

The integrity of democracy and representative government in New South Wales depends on high levels of participation by eligible voters. The NSW Electoral Commission aims to inform and engage all eligible citizens to participate in elections and understand the democratic process.

The Electoral Commission recognises some members of the New South Wales community face additional barriers to participation in democracy, including:

- people living with disability
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples
- people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds
- people experiencing homelessness.

The Electoral Commission works closely with voters, communities and community organisations, peak bodies and advocacy groups to identify, mitigate and – where possible – eliminate these barriers. This work is vital to ensure all people have fair and equal access to the democratic and electoral process.

Election-related resources for these target audiences are created in consultation with the NSW Electoral Commission's reference groups and informed by post-election research.

Reference groups

The NSW Electoral Commission has two community reference groups:

- Equal Access to Democracy (Disability) Reference Group
- Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Reference Group.

The Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) Reference Group and Equal Access to Democracy (Disability) Reference Group are made up of peak bodies and advocacy groups across New South Wales. The reference groups are established as a mechanism to provide guidance, information and feedback to the NSW Electoral Commission in relation to services for electors and to ensure that accessibility barriers to these services are identified and solutions to these barriers are reflected in the programs and services. This includes ensuring that a range of communication formats and channels are used to inform people about enrolment, elections and voting. Before each statewide election the CALD and Equal Access to Democracy (Disability) reference groups are consulted about their member needs and briefed about any changes to legislation, regulations and voting that may need to be communicated to their members and networks.

General resources and communications

The NSW Electoral Commission produced five core community awareness videos for the 2024 Local Government elections.

- Enrolling to vote for elections in New South Wales (views 5,300 as at 15 September 2024) Including information on how to enrol, enrolling without a fixed address and enrolling as a Silent elector.
- How to fill in your ballot papers (views 16,000 as at 15 September 2024) Details on how to fill out ballot papers and information on mayor ballot papers, a referendum ballot paper and/or a poll ballot papers.
- Voting options (views 10,000 as at 15 September 2024) Detailed information on voting options.
- How to vote by post (views 16,000 as at 15 September 2024) Specific information on postal voting including how
 to apply and complete a postal vote.
- Counting votes in local government elections (views 3,900 as at 15 September 2024) This was a new video created to address misinformation and disinformation regarding how votes are counted in local government elections.

These videos were produced with audio descriptions.

Elector Enquiry Centre

As in the previous two major election events, the NSW Electoral Commission outsourced its Elector Enquiry Centre (EEC) to a commercial call centre provider. Benefitting from the 2021 NSW Local Government and 2023 NSW State election events, this outsourcing approach proved highly successful and cost-effective.

The EEC was operational for seven weeks before the election and one week after the election. During this period 65,078 calls were managed by EEC agents, peaking being during election week where more than 26,000 calls were received and approximately 8,000 calls were diverted to the various NSW Electoral Commission support lines/helpdesks. Approximately 5,200 calls were handled on a single day during election week. The number of agents employed increased in line call increases throughout the election. At its peak, 70 EEC agents were active.

The NSW Electoral Commission also established an in-house call escalation team which was responsible for handling more complex or sensitive calls received by the EEC. This call escalation team handled almost 10,500 calls and responded to 12,600 enquiry emails through the election. The call escalation team employed a total of 12 agents.

Culturally and linguistically diverse communities – tailored resources and support

The NSW Electoral Commission creates, shares and promotes in-language communications and resources targeted to people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds. For the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the Electoral Commission developed numerous in language assets.

Assistance in-language

The NSW Electoral Commission published on its website translated information for the top 24 languages in NSW (based on 2021 Census data).

- The 24 languages included: Chinese Traditional, Vietnamese, Arabic, Chinese Simplified, Greek, Korean, Italian, Spanish, Macedonian, Turkish, Serbian, Khmer, Assyrian Neo-Aramaic, Croatian, Persian, Thai, Portuguese, Russian, Lao, Dari, Hindi, Tagalog, Maltese, and Polish.
- Two new languages were introduced for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections Kurdish and Nepali.

- The most viewed in-language page was the Chinese Simplified landing page, making up 23.4 per cent of overall page views to the assistance in your language subsite.
- Chinese Simplified, Chinese traditional, Vietnamese, Arabic and Korean pages dominated the top 10 most viewed assistance in your language pages.
- The CALD campaign was influential in the lead-up to the election with 61 per cent of users visiting the website
 from the campaign.

Translation of the community awareness videos

All five community awareness videos were translated (including voice over, on screen text and captions) into seven languages: Arabic, Cantonese, Greek, Italian, Korean, Mandarin and Vietnamese.

Other language support available

Translation and interpreting services were available via the National Translation and Interpreting Service (131 450).

Election staff working in voting centres who spoke a language in addition to English were available to assist voters inlanguage and could be identified by badges indicating the language(s) spoken.

Culturally and linguistically diverse communities - engagement programs

The NSW Electoral Commission is committed to building trust and confidence in the electoral and democratic systems and processes in NSW. Part of this commitment includes addressing barriers that people with culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds may face during elections.

To support this commitment, the NSW Electoral Commission conducts community engagement partnerships for CALD voters during statewide election events.

For 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the NSW Electoral Commission consulted the NSW Department of Customer Service's Diverse Communities and Partnership Team (DCP) for advice regarding partnership opportunities to increase CALD voters. An analysis was conducted by DCP to identify CALD organisations with strong community reach in targeted local government areas (LGAs) and language groups. Based on this analysis, DCP recommended seven organisations for consideration for the Electoral Commission's community engagement partnerships for 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

The Electoral Commission invited the seven organisations to submit proposals for the 2024 Local Government elections' CALD community engagement. Four organisations responded with proposals, which were evaluated by an internal selection committee based on organisational capacity and demonstrated expertise. As an outcome of the selection process, two organisations, NSW Ethnic Communities Council and Metro Assist, were identified as the preferred organisation to conduct community engagement, due to their significant networks with CALD organisations in Western Sydney and a proven track record of community engagement.

Vote Talk - produced in partnership with the Ethnic Communities Council of NSW

The Ethnic Communities Council of NSW (ECCNSW) is the peak body for all culturally and linguistically diverse communities in NSW. For the 2024 Local Government elections, the NSW Electoral Commission continued its partnership with ECCNSW to deliver the *Vote Talk* program.

Vote Talk is a series of community-led education, engagement and communication initiatives on voting and elections. The aim is to provide targeted education, radio spots and community conversations to raise the awareness of electoral processes and improve the voting practices and participation of CALD Australian citizens over 18 years of age.

Eight CALD language groups across Greater Sydney were targeted (based on low English language proficiency using the latest ABS Census data and feedback from the sector regarding high-priority groups): Arabic, Cantonese, Greek, Korean, Mandarin, Nepali, Hindi and Vietnamese. For the 2024 Local Government elections, the Vote Talk program included:

- community engagement sessions run by ECCNSW bilingual facilitators
- pre-recorded in-language messages on how to fill out ballot papers played on community radio in nine languages.

Key insights from the 2024 Local Government elections Vote Talk program included:

• ECCNSW engaged 1,228 individuals in over 80 in-language information sessions delivered in eight languages. This was an increase from the 2023 NSW State election, with 505 participants over 30 sessions in six languages.

- Over the course of six weeks leading up to the election, 36 in-language radio interviews were broadcast across community radio stations.
- Collaboration with local ethnic social media platforms and online community influencers reached a broad audience.

The Vote Talk program was evaluated using a 'before and after' survey format. An indication of the success of the program is shown by the change in responses from participants pre- and post-engagement.

- Confidence in, and knowledge of, voting options and how to vote increased from 25 per cent (pre-engagement) to 84.7 per cent (post-engagement)
- Preparedness to vote increased from 33.8 per cent (pre-engagement) to 81.4 per cent (post-engagement)

Metro Assist pilot partnership

For the 2024 Local Government elections, the Electoral Commission piloted a new community partnership with Metro Assist. Metro Assist is a community organisation in the Sydney Southwest area which has provided services to the culturally and linguistically diverse communities for over 35 years and focuses on engaging newly arrived, emerging and established migrants.

The pilot involved a multi-faceted campaign which aimed at: improving knowledge about the 2024 NSW Local Government elections, the importance of voting and increasing trust and confidence in the electoral and democratic systems with the CALD community. The campaign included community engagement sessions, a local print campaign, and a social media campaign.

Key insights from Metro Assist's pilot for the 2024 Local Government elections included:

- The eight community education sessions were attended by 169 participants; of whom, 160 participants indicated they then voted at the NSW 2024 Local Government elections.
- The majority of attendees confirmed their preference for voting in person (152 responses), followed by postal voting (seven responses).
- A targeted local print campaign with seven in-language advertisements reached over 124,000 readers.
- Paid social media campaign targeting CALD communities on Meta reached 214,800 users.
- Campaign support through Metro Assists social platforms including Facebook, WhatsApp, WeChat and LinkedIn
 and SMS messaging had a total reach of over 58,000. Campaign messaging included voting reminders and
 information on the voting process.

"Vote here" in-language banner trial

The NSW Electoral Commission continued its 'Vote here' banner trial for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections with banners in community languages erected outside polling places. The trial, first conducted for the 2023 NSW State election, is an outcome of recommendation #38 of the NSW Joint Standing Committee on Electoral Matters' (JSCEM) report into the administration of the 2019 NSW State election. Five languages in addition to English were selected for the in-language banners: Arabic, Traditional Chinese, Simplified Chinese, Vietnamese, and Greek. These were based on 2021 Census data.

For the 2024 Local Government elections, the pilot was conducted at 10 pre-poll and polling places in local government areas with high CALD populations and low voter turnout (excluding Liverpool and Fairfield, which used a private election provider): Canterbury-Bankstown, Cumberland, Sydney City and Inner West.

An external independent research provider was engaged to evaluate the banner trial by measuring the recall and impact of the banner on CALD voters. This was achieved through face-to-face surveys at five of the 10 pre-poll/polling place locations. Participants completed a five-minute survey.

Key findings:

- Two in five people surveyed recalled seeing the banner.
- Of the respondents who recalled seeing the banner, two-thirds agreed it told them where to vote and half agreed it welcomed them into the voting centre.

Although less than half the surveyed CALD voters recalled seeing a banner, the evaluation suggests that for those who did, the banner is helpful in fostering a welcoming and inclusive environment at the polling place. The NSW Electoral Commission will consider these findings to inform the future rollout of in-language banners at the 2027 NSW State election.

Translated stakeholder packs

The NSW Electoral Commission produced translated stakeholder packs in seven languages, collating all in-language resources, key messages and assistance available to voters. These stakeholder packs were distributed by SBS to community organisations and our reference group members The stakeholder pack was translated into Arabic, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, Vietnamese, Greek, Italian and Korean.

People with disability - tailored resources and support

Auslan video series

NSW Electoral Commission worked with Deaf Connect to develop an Auslan video series. These videos covered key information on the election: how and where to vote, postal voting and how to fill out your ballot papers. These videos were included on our 'Assistance in your language – Auslan' page, published on the Electoral Commission website. Topics included:

- general information on the 2024 NSW Local Government elections
- how to fill out your ballot papers
- voting options
- how to vote by post.

Deaf Connect also developed a blog post including information about the Auslan interpreting service through Skype. These resources were shared through their networks.

Auslan interpreting service

The Electoral Commission can also be contacted via the National Relay Service (NRS) during standard office hours: Monday to Friday, 9am-5pm.

The NSW Electoral Commission offered an Auslan interpreting service on early voting Saturday, 7 September and election day Saturday, 14 September 2024. Electors could connect with interpreters through Skype, by calling 'NSW elections Auslan' or 'NSW elections Auslan'. Two calls were received on election day for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

The NSW Electoral Commission is aware that the Skype platform is being decommissioned and will review its options for providing an Auslan interpreter service at future elections, including delivery platforms and interpreter providers.

Audio description for awareness videos

Based on advice from Vision Australia, audio description opening messages were included on all five English awareness videos. These were published on YouTube and the Electoral Commission's community education resources web page. Messages included:

- enrolling to vote for elections in New South Wales
- how to fill in your ballot papers
- voting options
- how to vote by post
- counting votes in local government elections.
- Easy-read guides

The Council of Intellectual Disability (CID) produced an easy-read guide for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

- Your right to vote 2024 NSW Local Government elections.
- An 'evergreen' voting easy-read guide was also available:
- Homelessness and voting.

'Your right to vote' video

The Council for Intellectual Disability produced a video tailored for people with intellectual disability about enrolling and voting at the 2024 NSW Local Government elections.

Braille ballot papers

The NSW Electoral Commission provided electors who are blind or have low vision the option to vote via braille postal ballot papers. Vision Australian assists with the production of these ballot papers. Seven applications for braille ballot papers were received for the Local Government elections 2024.

Telephone assisted voting

The NSW Electoral Commission provided electors who are blind or have low vision the option to vote via telephone assisted voting for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. For these elections, 760 electors registered to use the service, with 749 votes cast by close of voting (for the 2023 NSW State election, 849 electors registered for telephone assisted voting, with 830 of those electors casting a vote).

Information regarding telephone assisted voting for 2024 NSW Local Government elections was shared with voters via a paid partnership with Vision Australia, which included a newsletter and email communication to 14,000 of its NSW members.

Voting centre accessibility

All voting venues were equipped with a wheelchair accessible voting privacy screen, maxi pens, magnifiers and a 'table top' voting screen for electors who required a seat while casting a vote.

Information for people experiencing homelessness

The NSW Electoral Commission has 'evergreen' (non-election event specific) resources for people experiencing homelessness. These includes resources on enrolling and voting with no fixed address:

- an animated video (also translated into seven languages)
- information published on the Electoral Commission website.

Community education resources page

The NSW Electoral Commission developed a community educations resources page for the 2024 Local Government elections. This page included all resources available to organisations and community members to use and share with their networks, including awareness videos, easy read guides and in-language information.

It also highlighted key messages, key dates, and how community organisations could help share information about the 2024 Local Government elections.

These resources were also distributed by the reference group members and identified target organisations to their respective members and networks.

Key insights

- Over 2,000 users visited the community education resources landing page on the NSW Electoral Commission website.
- The most viewed resource on the community education landing page was the 'How to fill out your ballot papers' awareness video, followed by the factsheets, posters and the voting options awareness video.

Information, education and support for political participants

The information and education initiatives listed below support the implementation of the NSW Electoral Commission's 2024-25 regulatory priority number one, which relates to the compliance obligations of participants at the 2024 NSW Local Government.

Webinar series for candidates

A series of eight webinars were held in the lead up to the 2024 NSW Local Government elections. The webinars included a Q&A-style format where attendees could ask questions live and receive immediate responses. Webinar topics and dates were as follows.

Information provided about the registration of candidates, groups and third-party campaigners, political donations and electoral expenditure applied to the elections for all councils, including Fairfield City Council and Liverpool City Council.

Election bulletins for political participants

A series of 13 *Election bulletins* were issued throughout the election period covering various aspects of the election to ensure candidates and registered political parties were kept up to date with the election and their obligations. The bulletins were distributed via email and published on the NSW Electoral Commission website over the period 10 May to 11 October 2024

Nomination and registration notifications

Notifications were sent throughout the election period updating candidates, groups and parties about the status of their nomination and the registration status of electoral material. Political participants were communicated with directly by email upon registering and throughout the lead-up to the elections about various aspects of their electoral funding obligations, such as electoral expenditure and political donation caps, disclosures, campaign accounts, and the *Funding and Disclosure Online* system.

Information sessions for political participants

'Drop-in' sessions were available for political participants to discuss the online systems or to raise any questions regarding election processes.

Online information

Fact sheets (and associated forms) about the electoral funding obligations of electoral participants at these elections, including registering and electoral expenditure caps, were published on the NSW Electoral Commission's website as was a *Candidate handbook*, which contained extensive information about the elections.

Registered candidates, groups, and third-party campaigners were communicated with directly by email upon registering and throughout the election period about various aspects of their electoral funding obligations, such as electoral expenditure and political donation caps, disclosures, campaign accounts, and the *Funding and Disclosure Online* system.

Demonstration of online systems

Online nomination

Registered political parties were invited to attend a demonstration of the *Nomination Online Management System* (NOMS). The demonstrations provided an opportunity to view the system and ask questions regarding the application process to assist them in their preparation and lodgement of nominations.

How to register and submit disclosures online

Candidates, parties and third-party campaigners were provided information about how to access and use *Funding and Disclosure Online* during webinars, and instructional information was published on the website to support online registrations and disclosures of political donations and electoral expenditure.

Candidate and participant helpdesk

A dedicated helpdesk was established to manage candidate and participant enquiries regarding their obligations and the electoral processes. The helpdesk was operational from 8am to 6pm Monday to Friday, with Saturdays open during key operational dates (for example nomination period).

The helpdesk responded to 14,398 telephone enquiries between 1 June and 29 September 2024 regarding nominations, electoral material, registration of candidates and groups, electoral funding and campaign finance rules, scrutineers and results. During the same period, 15,359 emails were received and sent.

Helpdesk agent numbers ranged from a minimum of six prior to the start of the nomination period to 16 during the nomination and registration of electoral material periods, with five agents available on election day.

The maximum number of calls in a day (713) occurred on 13 August (the day prior to the close of nominations). On nomination day (14 August) 661 calls were received, including 420 calls prior to close of nominations at 12 noon. Election day Saturday, 14 September, saw 361 calls received. The average number of calls per day was 105; and the average call duration was 5 minutes 5 seconds.

Council liaison

Towards the end of 2023 and throughout 2024 the NSW Electoral Commission communicated regularly with NSW councils to help them understand the timing and requirements of the elections.

The NSW Electoral Commission published election advertisements on its website and in statewide newspapers (The Sydney Morning Herald, The Daily Telegraph and The Land) and supplied councils with advertisements to place locally.

In addition, the NSW Electoral Commission provided councils with a communication 'hub' and calendar, with resources and content available for council use. The hub contained advertising assets, FAQs, media releases, stock images, social media posts, save the date templates, press advertisement templates, fact sheets, newsletter copy, easy read guides, explainer videos both in English and translated into seven languages, in-language stakeholder engagement kits and poster and flyer templates for use within their local communities. These assets were supported by emails to activate use of assets and support for councils from the NSW Electoral Commission's media team.

Three webinars were held for councils providing key information and council responsibilities regarding the non-residential roll, pre-poll voting, constitutional referendums and election awareness artifacts.

Eleven election newsletters were distributed to councils providing key information and resources to assist with the conduct of the election.

Emails were also sent to all councils to provide updates on election planning progress, and councils were offered direct telephone access to the NSW Electoral Commission Customer Service team.

Council service agreements

Councils entered into service agreements to formally engage the NSW Electoral Commission to conduct their elections. These service agreements were developed around the requirements of s.296 of the Local Government Act and are standardised across all councils.

Councils that selected a commercial service provider (Fairfield and Liverpool) entered into separate agreements with their service provider. However, as enrolment data, enrolment products (that is, authorised rolls, forms and declaration envelopes) and enrolment support were provided to those councils by the NSW Electoral Commission, they were also required to sign an undertaking with the Electoral Commission to assure the security of the enrolment data.

Website

The website is key to the NSW Electoral Commission's customer-centred digital presence, to help voters, political participants and other election stakeholders understand and participate in the democratic processes in New South Wales.

There were a number of features enhanced for the 2024 Local Government elections. Of most significance was the update to the address lookup tool. Based on user research and testing, the tool provided a snapshot of key information based on an elector's enrolled address; where to vote, candidate information and how to vote.

Key metrics

- the 2024 NSW Local Government elections event page received 1,148,336 views across election week (that is, the week leading up to, and including, election day)
- the website reached 1.7m users during election week
- there was a trend towards pre-poll information the fourth most accessed page during the election period
- the average engagement time of 2m 53s and engagement rate of 86.9 per cent during the six week election phase is well above industry averages of the newly introduced Google metrics
- the address lookup tool was accessed 1.5m times
- peak hourly traffic on election day reached 96k active users at 10am.

Audience

The NSW Electoral Commission continues to move to a 'mobile-first' approach for key areas of its website. A mobile-first approach is a website development strategy that designs the site based on specifications for a mobile version (devices with small screens such as a smartphone), which can then be adapted to, or responsive to, larger screens (rather than the traditional approach of starting with a desktop site and then adapting it to smaller screens). This approach is supported by site analytics indicating that the majority of website visitors use a mobile device, with mobile usage having increased by more than 10 per cent for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections during the same sixweek election period compared with 2021.

Acquisition

During the six-week election phase, the majority of users (1,454,553) found the NSW Electoral Commission's website through organic search such as Google or Bing. The next highest group of users came directly to the website (294,439), which suggests positive sentiment for brand recall and awareness.

Election day

There were just under 700,000 users who accessed the site on election day spanning 3.3 million page views. An average engagement of nearly two minutes on the day suggests users were able to come to the site and perform their desired task(s), that is, find out where to vote, how to vote and who they can vote for.

NSW Electoral Commission's website performance

The website underwent rigorous performance testing to ensure the site was able to handle the spikes in traffic, particularly on election day. The site performed well under significant load, experiencing no major incidents and supporting the successful delivery of critical information.

Countback elections

A legislative amendment prior to the 2021 NSW Local Government elections enabled the use of a 'countback' election to fill a councillor vacancy (for example, following the resignation or death of a councillor) that occur after each ordinary election. This measure dispenses with the need for attendance by-elections. To adopt the use of countback elections:

- the council must pass a resolution at its first meeting after each ordinary that countback is to be used to fill a councillor vacancy
- the councillor vacancy needs to occur within 18 months of the last ordinary election of councillors.
- Following the September 2024 ordinary elections, 100 councils resolved at their first meeting to adopt countback to fill councillor vacancies (see Table 46).

Councils that did not adopt countback elections will be required to fill any casual vacancy that arises with an attendance by-election. The NSW Electoral Commission was not engaged to conduct the 2024 NSW Local Government elections for Fairfield and Liverpool City councils.

Election evaluation and customer research

The NSW Electoral Commission conducts robust research with voters, political participants and other election stakeholders to evaluate election services and to deliver actionable insights to increase understanding, trust and future participation in democracy.

Objectives of the research

For the 2024 NSW Local government elections, an external research provider was engaged to undertake research on behalf of the NSW Electoral Commission. This independent research aimed to:

- evaluate the election services provided by the NSW Electoral Commission
- · identify opportunities for service improvement
- understand the information needs and election experience for a range of election stakeholders (eligible voters and political participants).
- develop actionable insights for future election communications, services and experiences.

Research methodology

A mixed methodology was utilised, with tailored approaches for all participant cohorts included in the research. The final methodology included:

- Core survey: A computer assisted telephone interview (CATI) conducted with 1,200 eligible voters representative
 of the NSW eligible voting population.
- Polling place in-person survey: A series of intercept interviews at selected pre-poll and election day polling places with 926 voters who either self-completed on electronic devices or were aided to complete by interviewers.
- Postal voting survey: An online survey conducted with 393 respondents who applied to use postal voting.
- Culturally and linguistically diverse survey: A CATI survey conducted in-language with five key spoken language groups – Arabic (50), Mandarin (50) and Cantonese (50), Hindi (50) and Vietnamese (50).
- Political participant survey: A post-election online survey distributed by email (408 respondents).
- Scrutineer online survey: A post-election online survey distributed by email (355 respondents).
- Qualitative research using semi-structured telephone/Teams interviews with:
- 20 voters who used telephone voting
- 20 voters who registered for postal voting
- 20 voters who live with disability
- 20 First Nations people
- 20 youth (aged 16-18 years)
- nine political participants.

A supplementary survey was also conducted to specifically evaluate the use of in-language 'Vote here' banners for culturally and linguistically diverse voters at selected voting centres.

Council general managers and temporary election staff were also surveyed by the NSW Electoral Commission on a range of qualitative and quantitative metrics to evaluate their satisfaction with the election products and services offered and the NSW Electoral Commission's overall conduct of the elections. These surveys were conducted by the NSW Electoral Commission, separate to the independent research program.

The findings from all surveys provide insight into the experiences and satisfaction of election stakeholders, report on areas of strength or development for the NSW Electoral Commission, identify trends and provide a valuable evidence base to inform election services into the future.





Check count	A 'check' or 'second' count of all first preference votes from all polling places, postal, pre-poll and DIs conducted after election day. The results of the check count are considered to be the final count of first preference votes.

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About this report

Under section 393AA of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021*, after each ordinary election of councillors, the Electoral Commissioner must provide the Minister with a written report on the conduct of the election. This report is provided with respect to the 2024 NSW Local Government ordinary elections and is presented in two parts.

Part one provides an overview of the elections conducted by the NSW Electoral Commissioner on Saturday, 14 September 2024. It includes aggregated statistical information about the elections, information about voting methods, venues, staffing and funding. It also describes the impact of recent changes to the legislation that governs the conduct of local government elections in New South Wales.

Part one also summarises the integrity and enforcement activities of the Electoral Commission in relation to the conduct of participants in the elections. This work includes the registration of candidates, groups, and third-party campaigners for campaign finance regulation purposes; compliance operations undertaken during the elections; investigating allegations of breaches of electoral law; and any legal proceedings commenced to date in relation to the elections.

Part one also includes recommendations by the Electoral Commissioner for legislative reform around the conduct of local government elections.

Part two provides information about each individual local council election, including candidates, results (of councillor, mayoral, referendum and poll contests as applicable to each council), the breakdown of votes by vote type for councillor elections, as well as staffing and venue numbers by council.

All tables and figures are sourced to NSW Electoral Commission unless stated otherwise.

Notes to Part 2

Local government area maps

The maps for each council indicate the voting venues for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections (at June 2024). Where a ward or whole council area was uncontested, some voting venues were not subsequently required but are still indicated on the maps.

Undivided/divided councils

In New South Wales, an undivided council does not have any wards – all councillors are elected in a single local government area (LGA) by all electors enrolled in the council area. A divided council is split into wards. Councillors are elected by the electors enrolled in each ward to form the council for the whole local government area.

Types of elections

Councillor election

A local government area is either undivided or divided. A divided council is split into wards, and each ward has its own councillor elections. Councillors in an undivided council are elected by all voters in that council area. Councillors in a divided area are elected to represent each ward within the council area. An equal number of councillors are elected for each ward. The number of councillors elected varies between councils. Councillors were elected for a four-year term, shortened in the case of the September 2024 elections.

Mayor election

Mayors can be either elected by the voters (direct or popularly elected mayor) or elected by the new councillors (and from the councillors) following a council election.

Mayors who are elected by the voters serve a four-year term. The election of a mayor by voters and the election of councillors are conducted at the same time but are considered separate elections, with separate ballot papers. For example, if a council has a total of 10 councillors to be elected, and the mayor is elected by the voters, the election for that council would be for nine councillors and one mayor. A candidate can run for both councillor and mayor but, if elected as mayor, they cannot also hold office as a councillor. Where elected by the councillors, the mayor serves a two-year term. At the end of the two-year term the councillors elect a new mayor for the following two years. The NSW Electoral Commission is not involved in the election of mayors by the councillors.

Constitutional referendum

A council may decide to conduct a constitutional referendum. A constitutional referendum is required to be conducted to change the constitutional structure of the council. For example, changing the number of councillors, whether to divide the council area into wards or abolish all wards, or determine whether the mayor should be elected by the voters or by the councillors. For a constitutional referendum to pass, a majority of voters in the council area must have voted in support of the proposal. Voting in a constitutional referendum is compulsory and the result is binding on the council. If the constitutional referendum is passed, the result takes effect at the next local government elections.

Council poll

A poll is conducted to determine the opinion of electors. A council may decide to conduct a poll on any issue and the result is used by council to guide further planning decisions. The council can poll all voters in the council area or only a portion of voters. Voting in a poll is not compulsory and the result of a poll is not binding on the council.

Voting options

The voting options (voting channels) available to electors for the 2024 NSW Local Government elections were:

- in-person voting before election day during the pre-poll period (subject to eligibility)
- by postal vote (subject to eligibility)
- in-person voting on election day
- telephone assisted voting for electors who are blind or have low vision
- declared institution voting at appointed venues (an approved hospital, nursing home or convalescent home which is
 visited by election officials for the purpose of taking votes from residents who are unable to attend a voting centre).
 A declared institution confirms with the NSW Electoral Commission their preference for a visit by election officials or
 to be provided with postal votes to enable their residents to vote.

Each of the individual council election summaries includes a graph showing the number of total formal votes cast by vote type for the councillor election (if contested), grouped as follows:

- ordinary (votes cast at a polling place on election day, includes silent votes)
- pre-poll ordinary (votes cast in person during pre-poll, includes silent votes and votes cast at declared institutions)
- postal
- enrolment (votes cast by electors who enrol and vote on the same day, either during the pre-poll period or on election day)
- NAMAV (name already marked as voted when an elector attends a voting centre and is found to have their name already marked on the authorised roll as having voted but makes a written declaration that they have not voted already at this election)
- · telephone assisted votes.

Enrolment

Enrolment is as at the close of rolls at 6pm on Monday, 5 August 2024, and for contested councils/wards. Electoral rolls are 'closed' to facilitate confirmation of candidate/nominator eligibility and to enable the authorised roll to be printed. Electors can still enrol after this date and also enrol and vote on the same day during the voting period (if they have identification showing their address).

Participation

Turnout is calculated as total votes/enrolment. Participation is the number of electors who attempted to cast a ballot divided by enrolment. It is different from total votes in that it includes electors who cast a declaration vote that was not accepted into the count for some reason.

Apparent failure to vote

The failure to vote process had not been completed at the time of producing this report. The number of Apparent failure to vote notices issued is the initial number of notices sent.


Venue numbers

The pre-poll centre total published for each council includes the returning officer's office if it was used for the provision of early voting services. The number of declared institutions represents the number of facilities visited by election officials.

Staff numbers

The number of staff shown for each council is the number of staff working at pre-poll venues (excluding where a returning officer's office offered pre-poll voting) and election day polling place staff.




















